"MAKING OF MODERN JEWISH MIND" THEME OF SUPPER LECTURE SERIES

A series of lectures that will probably turn out to be the most enlightening ever to be delivered before any congregational audience, will begin on Sunday evening, February 27th in the Social Hall of the Synagogue. The series is on the general theme of "The Making of the Modern Jewish Mind," and, following a practice introduced two years ago, when a supper-lecture series was first

MANY ATTEND FIRST SERVICE OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S MINYAN

The first service of the Young People's Minyan was conducted last Sunday morning in the Chapel of the Synagogue. The service, which was followed by breakfast in the Social Hall, was attended by some forty worshipers, most of whom were boys and girls of Ramaz and the Religious School.

The Young People's Minyan is an outgrowth of the Father and Son Minyan and Breakfast which has been sponsored by our Men's Club for these past several years. Its scope was broadened to include boys and girls so that it has become a religious activity of and for young people. One of the young men officiates and the entire service is conducted by the boys and girls.

Mr. Myer B. Appleman, the principal of our Religious School, has announced that Mr. Aaron Krumbein of the faculties of both Ramaz and the Religious School, will henceforth be in charge of the Minyan. This is an assurance that the service will be conducted in a most attractive, American manner, retaining at the same

- 4. Abraham Isaac Kook the Composite Jewish Personality.

The Supper series will be held in the beautiful Social Hall, where a full course supper will be served before each lecture. The dates are February 27th, March 6th, March 27th and April 3rd. The charge for the entire series, including the supper of course, is \$10.00. Individual lectures are \$3.00. Reservation cards will be in the mails shortly, and an exceptionally large response is expected.

Mr. Ira F. Weisman, president of the Men's Club which is again sponsoring the series, pointed out the brilliant lectures of the two previous

RAMAZ PARENTS COUNCIL HEARS TALK ON LEISURE

In the second lecture of this year's series, which took place Tuesday evening in the Auditorium, the Ramaz School Parents Council heard Mrs. Josette Frank in an interesting—and, incidentally, comforting—talk on the "Leisure Time Activities of Children."

Referring to the time spent by children in poring over comic books and in listening to radio programs, Mrs. Frank said that these media attract the child during his "spare time" because they fill his need for adventure in an otherwise routine world. The fears manifested by parents over this thrilling, child-styled adventure are more detrimental to his development than the actual programs or comics themselves.

These experiences, continued the speaker, will in no way be harmful to the child if he is fortified with inner security. It is the role of the parents to provide this security and then be tolerant of the various stages through which the child passes.

Rabbi Lookstein, who followed the speaker with a brief word, assured the parents from his own experiences that the "horror programs" of today are the sources of fond reminiscences when the child grows up.

Mrs. Frank's talk, which was warmly received by a well-filled auditorium, was preceded by a regular business meeting at which the Ramaz Council Bazaar was launched. Mrs. Lester Krulwich and Mrs. Aaron Neustadter were named chairmen of this project.
