# Hear Prof. Sukenik at Forum Meeting —

Tuesday evening, it was the privilege of the Men's Club to have Prof. Eleazar L. Sukenik, Director of the Museum of Jewish Antiquities at the Hebrew University in Israel, as its guest speaker. Prof. Sukenik spoke on "The Romance of Jewish Archeology," a subject to which he has devoted his entire life, and in which he is recognized as one of the outstanding experts.

In a most interesting and fascinating talk, in which the speaker's keen sense of humor manifested itself at regular intervals, Prof. Sukenik described some of the archaeological expeditions he conducted and the results that were achieved. The unique feature inherent in Jewish archeology, he pointed out, was the intimate relationship between ancient Mosaics or pot-shells, or scrolls and the modern Jewish citizen of Israel. A kinship, from which an almost possessive attitude results, has arisen between the relics recovered from the excavation at an ancient synagogue, and the k'vutzah or settlement that exists on that spot today.
