BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE AGAIN TO BE PUBLISHED

For the past several years our congregation has published a Book of Remembrance in connection with its annual Yiskor Appeal. This book contains an appropriate prayer together with the names of the departed ones to be memorialized on the four occasions of the year when Yiskor is recited.

GROVE IN ISRAEL PLANTED IN HONOR OF RABBI

Further honor was bestowed upon our Rabbi in commemoration of his twenty-fifth anniversary as the spiritual leader of Kehilath Jeshurun, when a grove of one thousand trees was planted in his name in Israel.

The award was made by the Palestine Planters, an organization devoted to the aims of the Jewish National Fund, of which our esteemed member, Mrs. Eli Goldstein, is president. The dedication took place on April 26th, at a luncheon at the Savoy-Plaza Hotel, which was attended by a number of members of our own Sisterhood.

Rabbi Lookstein was the main speaker of the luncheon, at which Mr. Ted O. Thackery, former editor of the New York Post, who was also honored that afternoon, also spoke.

Kehilath Jeshurun takes note of this event with pride. We are happy that it is our Rabbi who is honored by other organizations who recognize his leadership and salute him for his devotion to the causes of the Jew and Israel. And we are happy that the honor which came to our Rabbi contributed at the same time to the upbuilding of our homeland, Israel.

We should like to emphasize that this is by no means a fund-raising project. It is free of every aspect of commercialism. It is consistent with the Yiskor prayer in which a pronouncement of a pledge for charity is made. In order that such a pledge may be properly fulfilled, we give our congregants an opportunity to make a Yiskor offering prior to the Shavuoth festival. The names in whose memory the offering is made are included in the Book of Remembrance which is placed in the hands of our worshippers during the memorial service.

In order to stress the purely religious character of the offering, it was decided that it be no less than five dollars and no more than ten dollars. Thus, the offering is purged of any material tinge and represents purely a token of reverence for the departed.

We are about to publish the 1949 Book of Remembrance and we know that all of our worshippers will want to have the names of their departed ones memorialized in that book. A special form for that purpose has been prepared and mailed to all our congregants and friends. It is reproduced on page 2 for the convenience of our readers.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S MINYAN CONDUCT FINAL SERVICE

Last Sunday morning, the final service of the Young People's Minyan took place in the Chapel, with a large number of the youthful congregants present. Morris Amitay, George Gruen and Lothar Frank officiated as the cantors, and Iris Gordon and Jerrold Hirsch delivered sermonettes.

At the conclusion of the service, before the youngsters partook of the breakfact that followed, a Memorization Contest was conducted, with the winners whose names follow, receiving tickets to a baseball game of their favorite team. The Contest was interesting to behold, for it was an outgrowth not of persistent memory work, but a natural consequence of regular and conscientious prayer. The results achieved by the contestants were remarkable; indeed some of the most difficult passages came as naturally to them as if they had been read. Judge Rothenberg, former president of the Zionist Organization of America, now occupies the position of its Vice-President, and at the same time is the President of the Jewish National Fund. As if the duties of these positions were not enough, Judge Rothenberg is also serving national Co-Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal and Associate Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal. He was one of the incorporators of the America.

can Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and has been a member of the Executive Committee of the J.D.C. since its inception.

With a lifetime of service to his people already a part of his personal history, Judge Rothenberg continues to give of his time, effort and invaluable guidance to every worth-while cause, both in America and in Israel. He was the recipient of the Treasury Silver Medal Award for distinguished service to our country in leading an effort resulting in the sale of \$20,000,000 in Victory Bonds. And, in recognition of his manifold services to Palestine upbuilding, a Jewish settlement there was named in his honor.

Our guests at the Ninth Annual Dinner will be treated to one of those occasions that comes once in a lifetime, for our guest speaker will give them an experience they will long remember.
