MIDNIGHT SELICHOT SERVICES TO BE CONDUCTED THIS SATURDAY

The High Holiday season will be ushered in this Saturday night at 12:45 a.m., when the traditional Selichot Service will be held in the Synagoque.

In past years, the Selichot Service was an occasion for the older folk to assemble for special prayers. It was generally conducted in the wee hours of the morning when none but the most hearty could attend.

Several years ago, we decided to popularize the service to make it intelligible and attractive to the modern worshipper. It was our aim to embellish it with some of the features that would make it more meaningful and inspiring to the young, as well as to the older folks alike. As a result, the last few years have brought ever-increasing numbers to the midnight service. The ladies as well as the men congregants attended; oftentimes entire families came together.

We extend our warmest invitation to our worshippers to attend the Selichot service once again this year. The service lasts a little over an hour. As in the past, prayer books with English translations are available to all. Explanatory interpolators will make many of the prayers clear and understandable. Congregational melodies will form part of the Service.

Cantor Hyman Gertler will officiate and Rabbi Lookstein will, of course, conduct the entire service. Our Synagogue should therefore be filled with men and women, joined together to usher in the High Holiday season in the proper religious spirit.
