Rabbi Lookstein addressed a message to the Bulletin which is intended for the Kehilath Jeshurun collegiates. The message follows:

"Many young people who are away at college would welcome an occasional word from their synagogue back home. Some might even like to hear every now and then from the Rabbi of their congregation. They might want to receive the weekly Bulletin regularly. When they return home for the various vacation periods they might like to receive some honor at a synagogue service —a call to the Torah or a Maftir. Occasionally a problem may present itself to them on which they would like the opinion of the Rabbi who knew them from earliest childhood. The Rabbi, in turn, who frequently is invited to address student bodies at out-of-town colleges would be delighted on those occasions to spend some time with a young congregant of his who might be a student at that college.

"I am therefore anxious to have the address of every college young man or woman affiliated with the congregation. Just drop a card to the synagogue office giving me your name and where you can be reached. The rest will be taken care of for you. Parents who may read this little note can be helpful by providing the information requested.

"A successful academic year to our collegiate and a happy New Year to them and their families."

This message speaks for itself and we are sure that our collegiates and their parents will take full advantage of it.

CONGREGATIONAL SEASON OPENS WITH HIGH HOLIDAYS

With the evening service on Rosh Hashanah night, Friday, September 23rd, the congregational season begins. Plans and programs that have been considered for months will be set into operation. The Afternoon Religious School, the Ramaz Lower and Upper Schools, the Adult Institute, the club program, the Men's Club and the Sisterhood will all begin to function. In point of fact, some of the aforementioned have already been functioning for several weeks.

PARENTS' CLUB STEERING COM-MITTEE TO MEET SEPTEMBER 28th

The first meeting of the season of the Parents' Club will take place Wednesday evening, September 28th at 8:00 o'clock in the Library. Mrs. Benjamin Leifert, president of the group, is certain that all members of the Committee, which has this year been enlarged to allow for greater participation in the Club's activities, will be on hand next Wednesday evening.

The first meeting will be devoted to laying plans for the entire year's program. A schedule of Open Meetings, devoted to the discussion of matters that make for a better relationship between Hebrew School and home, will be arranged at this first session of the Steering Committee. Also to be discussed are plans for a program of events for the children of the Religious School: the Junior Congregation, assemblies, and so on.

A year of successful activity lies ahead. If the Parents' Club will but continue along the pattern it set last year — its first year of existence we can look forward to another eventful and active season for the youngest of our congregational affiliates. The Main Synagogue will be filled to capacity. All seats have been reserved. For the first time in our history we will hold an overflow service in the Auditorium of the Synagogue House. About two hundred worshippers are expected at that service. The officiating cantors will be Mr. Meyer Blumberg and Mr. Morris Adler. The sermons will be preached by Rabbi Zelo Shussheim.

It is needless to say that the services both in the Main Synagogue and in the Auditorium of the Synagogue House will be conducted in accordance with the standards to which our worshippers have long been accustomed. Thought has in addition been given to the physical convenience of worshippers. Im-proved checking facilities have been provided so that worshippers will be able to check hats and coats and retrieve them at the close of services without any delay whatever. White skull caps will be made available. A capable staff of ushers and usherettes will be in attendance. In a word, every detail has been taken care of in order that our worshippers may enjoy a dignified and inspiring service in a comfortable and impressive physical environment.

1948-49 YEAR BOOK FAVORABLY RECEIVED

Once again, the Kehilath Jeshurun Year Book has evoked high praise from our members and from the Jewish community at large. With its appearance in the beginning of July, reaction was spontaneous and favorable from the hundreds of readers who received the volume.

The section devoted to the Pictorial Album was pointed out in particular as worthy of the highest commendation. Dedicated to "Israel—a Prophecy Fulfilled," this section contains pictures of certain outstanding events that led to the establishment of the new state; the personalities that made it possible, and the leaders that now guide its destiny. Included in the Album is a Chronology of the Birth of Israel, a calendar of some of the most important dates in the history of the young republic.

As in previous years, the Year Book contains articles of interest to our members and to the historian of the future. The Synagogue Year in Review—a resume of every activity held within the confines of our buildings—will be of particular value to the chronicler of years hence, for it depicts in detail the activities of one of the oldest and most important Jewish synagogues in the country.

Once again reports of the President and of the Presidents of the Men's Club and Sisterhood may be found within the pages of the Year Book. In addition, several other important reports of congregational activities of last year are also contained therein. These reports are of general interest to our membership; of particular interest is the recording of Yahrzeit dates for the coming year in the section devoted to the Jewish Calendar. In this section, there appear brief interpretations of the holidays and festivals that occur and, on a page devoted to every month, there are listed the Yahrzeits of deceased parents of our members for that particular month.

All in all, it is another feather in our cap. The literary and artistic composition of this year's volume leave very little to be desired. It is beautiful to behold and interesting to read. It is, in a word, a fitting product of Kehilath Jeshurun.

SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES

Many worshippers will be with us for the first time these High Holy Days. For their benefit, as well as for the benefit of our regular worshippers, we make known the following ordinances:

(1) Admission to the services during the High Holy Days will be by card only. This rule will be strictly enforced.

(2) There will be no vacant seats during the holidays. We, therefore, ask our worshippers not to bring children to the Synagogue unless seats have been reserved for them. To do otherwise will crowd and inconvenience those who have a right to their seats.

(3) The doors are closed during the sermon. Please, therefore, be in your seat before the sermon begins.

(4) Please join in the congregational singing.

(5) Conversation of any kind is forbidden during the services. Proper decorum is essential for dignified worship.

(6) Please do not remove the Talith or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of the services.

(7) Our worshippers are invited to take advantage of the checking facilities on the main floor, for the checking of hats and coats. White skull caps are available for the use of all male worshippers. They may be obtained at the checking counter.

(8) Uniform Prayer Books are available to all. A Prayer Book will be found on every seat. At the close of services please leave the Prayer Book on your seat.

High Holiday Ushers —

Under the Chairmanship of Mr. George Jacobs, a committee of ushers has been appointed to serve during the Holiday season. A charming group of young ladies will act as usherettes in the ladies section.

Members on this Board are performing a labor of love. They do their job voluntarily and devotedly. It is expected that our worshippers will cooperate with them in carrying out all the regulations and procedures designed to make our service more dignified, more impressive and more inspiring.
