YOUNG PEOPLE'S MINYAN TO RESUME SERVICES SUNDAY, OCTOBER 30th

The Young People's Minyan, which suspended its activities for the summer months, will resume conducting its own services Sunday morning, October 30th, at 9:30 o'clock, in the Chapel.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL KINDERGARTEN REOPENS SUNDAY MORNING

The Kindergarten group that was added to the Religious School roster of classes last year, will re-open its sessions for the coming term this Sunday morning. The class will continue to meet every Sunday morning from 10:00 o'clock until noon and will be under the supervision of a young, expertly-trained and qualified instructor.

The program is the same that is to be found in the better Kindergartens with the exception that material of Jewish content is emphasized. Activities center about Jewish ceremonial objects, Jewish customs, life in Israel and Jewish holidays and festivals. Common objects that the child is likely to encounter are referred to by their Hebrew names, so that from the earliest age, the child is introduced to Hebrew culture.

Parents of children between the ages of 4 and 6 are urged to take advantage of our Kindergarten. Mr. Myer B. Appleman, Principal of our Religious School, will be happy to furnish interested parties with whatever information they desire. He may be reached at the school office daily from 3 to 6; Sunday from 9:30 to 12:00.
