THE RABBI'S SERMON THIS SATURDAY

Last week there was a notice that the Rev. Leonard Feeney, a Jesuit, was expelled from the Order by his archbishop, The reason given for the action was "disobedience." Actually, the dismissal was caused by Father Feeney's views. He maintains that non-Catholics cannot enter heaven.

The incident has caused a good deal of discussion in theological circles. The question of salvation and the merits of the various religious faiths is basic to religion, even as the problem of relativism is fundamental to all philosophies. Rabbi Lookstein, therefore, has chosen for his subject this Saturday morning, "Judaism, Protestantism and Catholicism — Which has the Key to Salvation?"

Need we tell our worshipers that they may expect a learned, fearless and most interesting sermon. Our advice — do not miss being in the synagogue this Saturday.
