DEAD LINE FOR YEAR BOOK ADS DRAWS NEAR

The January 31st dead-line for getting ads for the 1950 Year Book is rapidly approaching, but we are still considerably behind in our campaign to raise \$25,000 for the Educational Scholarship Funds of Ramaz School and the Religious School.

During the past week, we added another new-comer to our list of "big ad-getters" in the person of Jack Poust. A substantial amount in ads has already been received in the office, and we have good reason to believe he is still far from his total. There have been several bright spots in this year's drive, mainly in the form of new workers. But, as against these encouraging sides, the possibility of falling short of the necessary quota still looms great. To overcome this, and to assure the Educational Scholarship Fund of the amount it needs, an added "something" is required: that you get one ad. Devote fifteen minutes to this job — that is all the time it takes to get your local storekeeper or your business associate to give you an ad.

RAMAZ STUDENT PUBLICATION CITED FOR EXCELLENCE

The Ramaz "Scroll", the annual student publication of the elementary department of Ramaz, has been awarded second place in the national contest sponsored by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association of Columbia University. A certificate in recognition of this award has been received by the school office.

The 132-page volume was the product of the children, who not only contributed articles in both English and Hebrew, but handled all the art work and the lay-out themselves. Replete with photographs and drawings, the "Scroll" is a precious collection of original poems and stories, interviews and reports, submitted by children from the first grade through the eighth. Only in a supervisory capacity did faculty members participate in the production of the book.

To all who had a hand in the 1949 "Scroll" — heartiest congratulations on a well-deserved honor. We are hoping for First Prize next year, and we know you can do it!

High-lighted by heated arguments among the three speakers, the symposium brought to the fore some interesting points of view. One of the speakers defined a Jew from a positive approach; the other two, who maintained similar outlooks, found no common bond by which a Jew can be identified with his people. The platform virtually shook with the excitement aroused by claims and counter-claims, assertions and denials — to which were added several pointed and intelligent remarks from among the audience.

The meeting lasted long beyond the normal "closing time" but all who attended found that time passed all too quickly. As usual, the collation which followed the meeting was also well received.
