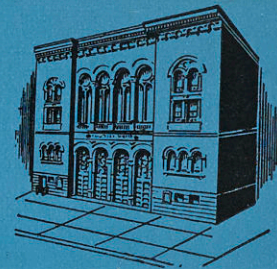

OUR DAILY SERVICES DURING THE SUMMER

While all major congregational activities and functions are suspended for the summer months, daily and Sabbath services are held according to a year-round uninterrupted schedule. The attendance at services during the past year has increased consistently — a fact of which we are genuinely gratified and proud.

With the coming of the summer months, however, when so many of our worshippers leave the city for seashore or mountain resorts, the attendance naturally decreases. Sabbath services, of course, still attract a goodly number of congregants. The daily services, on the other hand, present a bit of a problem.

The community which our congregation serves is, unfortunately, not heavily populated with Jewish residents. We cannot, therefore, expect a casual passer-by to drop in for services. We must rely upon our regular worshippers to provide our daily morning and evening minyan.

Daily services are held in the Chapel, where cool comfort accompanies a short but dignified service, at 7:30 in the morning and 6:30 in the evening. On the Sabbath, the services are conducted in the Main Synagogue, where we will continue to provide our worshippers with a decorous and spiritually-uplifting service in pleasant and comfortable surroundings.

We appeal to our readers to help us maintain the fundamental institution of daily services by attending as frequently as possible. If you are in the city and find it possible to join us of a morning or an evening, please make it a point to do so. You

tion he received from his co-workers, and the outstanding role played by Mr. Jacobs in every facet of the alteration project. He added a few words of how thankful he was to have been privileged to see the project completed and to have done his share in it. Mr. Levy concluded his remarks by making mention of the final phase of the Building Fund Campaign: the amount still needed to write "finis" to the entire undertaking.

Mr. Etra then called upon Rabbi Lookstein for a few words. The Rabbi first took the occasion to commend the work of each member of the Committee. He echoed the sentiments expressed by Mr. Etra in praise of the Chairman, our elder statesman, Samuel Levy, whose keen judgment, experience and staunch support provided a source of unflinching encouragement, and set an example for all of his fellow members to follow. Continuing, the Rabbi elucidated upon what has been aptly termed "Operation Clean-up." The Rabbi reviewed the campaign, from its beginning in 1944 to the present time, and what has been accomplished with the proceeds of annual drives for funds. He reported on the decision of the Board to embark upon a final major campaign — one for \$50,000 — with which to complete the commitments made in the course of the alteration work.

The Rabbi's talk was greeted with a most heartwarming, spontaneous reaction. Handsome contributions were announced from the floor; many, who preferred to make their contributions privately, made known their gifts to Mr. Etra at the end of the evening. In all, the response was so generous that the quota set is well within our grasp.
