

RESERVATIONS FOR MEALS IN SUKKAH NOW BEING TAKEN

Arrangements have been completed for holiday meals to be served in our Sukkah during the forthcoming Sukkoth festival. Full-course catered meals will be served Monday and Tuesday nights, September 25th and 26th; Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, September 26th and 27th; Friday night, September 29th; and Saturday afternoon, September 30th.

Plans for Sukkah meals were formulated in order to render the observance of Jewish holidays more meaningful and more beautiful. Our large and beautifully-decorated Sukkah is on the third floor of the Synagogue House, and will be the scene of joyous festivity appropriate to the spirit of Sukkoth.

The price per plate has been set at a nominal \$5.00. This covers everything that will be required, including gratuities.

To assure yourself of an enjoyable Yom Tov in keeping with the traditional practice of having meals in the Sukkah, we suggest you call the Synagogue office now and place your reservations.

The dead-line for making reservations is Wednesday, September 20th. In order to avoid involved bookkeeping records, **all reservations must be accompanied by check.**

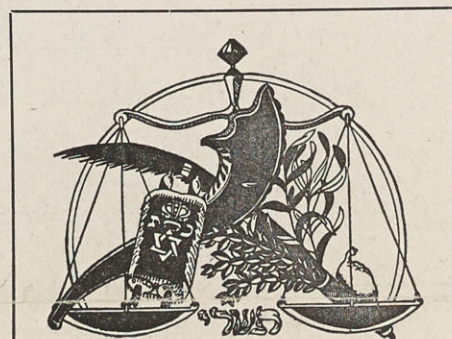
Provide Yourself With Ethrog and Lulav —

The High Holidays themselves promise to be more impressive than ever. The Main Synagogue will once again be filled to capacity. To accommodate our many other worshippers, an Auxiliary Service will be conducted in the Auditorium of the Synagogue House. A large number of congregants are expected at that service, at which Mr. Meyer Blumberg and Cantor Aaron Holand will officiate. In charge of this service will be a youthful graduate of Yeshiva University, Rabbi Saul Roth, who will preach during the holidays in a manner to which Kehilath Jeshurunites are accustomed. Rabbi Roth is a former student of our own Rabbi and an extremely apt speaker. We are sure that those who will attend services in the Auditorium have a rare treat in store for them.

It is needless to say that the services in both the Main Synagogue and the Auditorium of the Synagogue House will be conducted in accordance with the high standards we have set over the years. Thought has, in addition, been given to the physical convenience of our worshippers. Improved checking facilities have been provided so that worshippers will be able to check their hats and coats and retrieve them at the close of services without any delay whatever. White skull caps will be made available to the men-folk. A capable staff of ushers and usherettes will be in attendance to assist in the common aim of a dignified and

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SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES

Many worshippers will be with us for the first time these High Holidays. For their benefit, as well as for the benefit of our regular worshippers, we make known the following ordinances:

(1) Admission to the services during the High Holidays will be by card only. This rule will be strictly enforced.

(2) There will be no vacant seats during the holidays. We therefore ask our worshippers not to bring children to the Synagogue unless seats have been reserved for them. To do otherwise will crowd and inconvenience those who have a right to their seats.

(3) The doors will be closed during the sermon. Please be in your seat before the sermon begins.

(4) Please join in the congregational singing.

(5) Conversation of any kind is forbidden during the services. Proper decorum is essential for dignified worship.

(6) Please do not remove the Tallith, or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of the services.

(7) Our worshippers are invited to take advantage of the checking facilities on the main floor, for the checking of hats and coats. White skull caps are available for the use of all male worshippers. They may be obtained at the checking counters.

(8) Uniform Prayer Books are available to all. A Prayer Book will be found on every seat. At the close of services please leave the Prayer Book on your seat.

(9) A House of Worship should at all times command the respect of every Jew, particularly during the days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Worshippers' attire should be conservative and subdued in keeping with the sanctity of the House of God and the solemnity of the season.

(10) Kohanim who participate in the Priestly Benediction are requested to wear white sneakers during the brief ceremony. These sneakers, bearing the name of the owner, may be brought to the synagogue on

1949-50 YEAR BOOK FAVORABLY RECEIVED

Once again the Kehilath Jeshurun Year Book has evoked high praise from our members and from the Jewish community at large. With its appearance during the summer, reaction was spontaneous and unanimously favorable from the hundreds of readers who received the volume.

As in previous years, the 1950 Year Book contains articles of interest to its readers and to the historian of the future. The Synagogue Year in Review — a resume of every activity held within the confines of our buildings — will be of particular value to the chronicler of years to come, for it depicts in detail the activities of one of the oldest and most important synagogues in the country.

The section devoted to the Pictorial Album was pointed to in particular as worthy of highest commendation. Dedicated to pictures of great Jews and Jews who are great, the Album, entitled "Our National Gallery" contains portraits of Jewish figures who "attained distinction in the various fields of intellectual endeavor, in the realm of public life, in the creative arts and in humanitarian service." Included too were Israeli personalities whose efforts are contributing to the grandeur of the new-born state in the Holy Land. Some forty-five pictures comprise this section — a valuable collection of outstanding Jewish personalities.

Once again reports of the President, and of the presidents of the Men's Club and Sisterhood are to be found within the pages of the Year Book. In addition, several other important reports of congregational activities of last year are contained therein. A special article, "The Jewish Day School", was written by Rabbi Lookstein, on the occasion of the thirteenth anniversary of Ramaz School. Of particular interest to our members is the recording of Yahrzeit dates for the coming year in the section devoted to the Jewish Calendar. In this section, there appear brief interpretations of the holidays and festivals that occur and, on a page devoted to every month, there are listed the Yahrzeits of deceased parents of members for that particular month.
