'51 YEAR BOOK CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED AT TESTIMONIAL DINNER TO JULES PODELL Goal of \$35,000 Set for Educational Scholarship Fund

Some thirty members of the Board of Trustees gathered at a Testimonial Dinner in the Social Hall last Thursday evening, November 9th, to pay tribute to Jules Podell, a

vice-chairman of the 1950 Year Book, who has spearheaded Year Book drives for the last four years. The Dinner was the result of a resolution passed at the last

meeting of the Board, whereby it was decided to honor the man who has been so devoted in his efforts for the Educational Scholarship Fund, and who, during the last four campaigns, has been personally responsible for close to one-half of the totals

achieved. Taking the lead from Mr. Podell's remarks, in which he said he would

"try to do better this year, Mr. Max J. Etra, president of the Congregation, who presided, announced the opening of the 1951 Year Book campaign, the proceeds of which will again go to the Educational Scholarship Fund of the two schools we sponsor: our all-day Ramaz School, and our afternoon Religious School. In order to meet the ever-increasing demands made upon the Fund by deserving children who seek scholarship aid, the quota of \$35,000 was set for this year's drive.

Plaque Presented to Guest of Honor -

The proceedings at the Dinner were simple, direct and impressive. Mr. Etra introduced our honored guest to those present and spoke briefly of Mr. Podell's background, deep philanthropic feeling, and his accomplishments on behalf of the Scholarship Fund. He then presented a beautiful mounted plaque to Mr. Podell (see picture on page 3) as tangible evidence of the appreciation we feel for the work he did and the results he attained. Mr. Podell's response was a short but obviously heartfelt word of thanks, and a promise to try to improve upon his previous records during the coming campaign. Rabbi Lookstein followed Mr. Podell and, he too, spoke of the extraordinarily fine work our guest of honor did in the short time he has been affiliated

with Kehilath Jeshurun. Then, the Rabbi continued to speak about the Year Book — its almost unique position as a source for the future historian for material on the Jewish community; its appearance as far as a publication is concerned; and the financial results it leads to. The Educational Scholarship Fund was described by the Rabbi, who brought several poignant examples of how brilliant but poor children were given the opportunity to study at Ramaz through scholarship aid.

Year Book Committee Appointed —

Mr. Etra announced the appointment of Mr. Podell as chairman of the 1951 Year Book Committee, and named Alexander Gross and Elliott W. Siegel as co-chairmen. Appointed as vice-chairmen were Harry W. Baumgarten, Martin Klein, Aaron H. Onish, Abraham R. Winer and Louis W. Yohann. The composition of the Committee in general has not as yet been announced, but we know that with the leadership it will have this year, our campaign will be met with the success it deserves.

Work on New Year Book Begun —

Work on the 1951 Year Book was begun immediately. Ad blanks were distributed to many of those present Thursday evening, and the synagogue office has already started contacting ad-getters to help them launch their individual campaigns.

Just a word to our readers: This is not an activity that concerns only the Year Book Committee. It is a project which demands and should receive the cooperation of every Kehilath Jeshurunite — member, seat-holder, affiliate, parent — EVERYONE who has the interest of Jewish education at heart.

REGISTRATION IN ADULT INSTITUTE CLOSES MONDAY

With sessions in the Kehilath Jeshurun Institute this Monday evening. the period of registration will be brought to a close on one of the most remarkable achievements in our history. A program of education that attracted some one hundred adults almost immediately after it was inaugurated, must be considered remarkable. And the interest that was evoked by our "students" even after the very first lesson was no less remarkable. For immediately after sessions ended four weeks ago, cries of "Shalom" and "Moreh" and "Talmud" echoed through the halls of the Synagogue House.

We are happy that we can bring to our membership and to the community at large an apportunity to learn some of those things we never learned or have long since forgotten. We are happy that we can offer an excellent teaching staff for a choice variety of subjects that will appeal to the adult. Such subjects as Hebrew, Prayers, Cantillations, Talmud, and a lecture course on the Bible are included in the curriculum, and each is designed to treat the subject-matter for adult consumption.

Are you among our "students"? If not, drop in Monday evening and enroll for one of the courses. The study courses are given every Monday at 8:00; the Bible Lecture Course, which is given by Rabbi Lookstein, is held in the Social Hall on alternate Mondays at 9:30.
