RABBI CONCLUDES

LECTURES ON BIBLE

Included as one of the star features of our Kehilath Jeshurun Institute this semester was Rabbi Lookstein's series of Bible Lectures which came to a close last Monday. Some 60 students attended each of the five lectures and if the response and enthusiasm they demonstrated is any criterion at all this can be considered a real educational "bull's-eye!" The students not only learned and were entertained; even more significant, they were inspired to re-learn and to return to their Bible. A fine Bibliography was distributed at the close of the series and we know that it will be well and conscientiously used.

The Rabbi's discussion of the literature of the Bible, the Miracles and Allegories, the historic period, the Commentaries and translations was stimulating and on a high scholarly level that did not belie the title of the series, "The Bible and the Adult Mind." Many doubts were resolved; many uncertainties were clarified. The vigor and energy of the series was demonstrated by the active question and answer period that followed each lecture. The only complaint that we heard was that the series was not long enough! Those that attended need no further description; to those that were not there we can only say that they missed a lively academic treat such as only our Rabbi can provide.

In the second series of our Adult Institute, beginning in February, the Rabbi will give his Sunday Supper Lectures on the subject, "The Drama of God and Man: A Study of Four Major Books of the Bible." In this series Job, Ecclesiastes, Jonah and the Psalms will be discussed. We know that all the Rabbi's former students will want to re-register for this course and we are sure that those of you who missed the Bible Lectures will not need to be urged to take advantage of the Sunday Supper Lectures.
