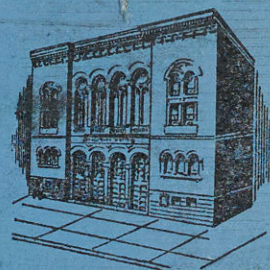

More than 200 people attended the first two lectures given by Rabbi Lookstein in his series of four on "The Drama of God and Man." We often complain that adult education is likely to fall by the wayside and be eclipsed by the ephemeral demands of life. Well, here is a direct refutation of that complaint — a fine group of young, alert, serious men and women attending a group of lectures intellectual in character and inspirational in content.

**Rabbi Dramatizes Bible —**

The books of the Bible are supposedly known to everyone and are, therefore, more often than not ignored by everyone. In his discussion of Job and his encounter with evil, and of Ecclesiastes and his inquiry into cynicism, the Rabbi dramatized the vitality of these two books for our time. Job and Ecclesiastes probe into the heart of the problems that beset modern man. Materialism, Existentialism, Cosmic Theism — are all phi-

losophies of our day and yet they all are contained and often find their answer in the works of our sages. The lively question and answer period that followed the Rabbi's talks showed how apt and how timely these two books are for all of us.

**Next Lecture to Discuss "Jonah" —**

We are sure that those who have attended the two sessions already given will need no reminder. To the rest of you, we merely say that the next lecture will take place on March 18th and will analyze "Jonah: The Resistance to Fate." The final talk of the series will be on April 1st, at which time the topic will be: "The Psalms: The Epic of God-Intoxication."

We have not even mentioned the delicious dinner that precedes the lectures nor the fine atmosphere of good fellowship and sociability that prevails. This series is rightfully one of Kehilath Jeshurun's most popular institutions. If you have not already reserved for the final two lectures, do so immediately.

Mr. Jules Podell, Chairman of the 1951 Year Book campaign, has disclosed that the committee has set the end of March as the dead-line for the ad-getting facet of Year Book work, and that the curtain will come down on solicitations Friday, March 30th.

Simultaneously, he announced that a final, all-out, beat-the-deadline effort will be made during this month in order to come closer to our \$35,000 goal than we now stand, and even, if possible, to pass the quota.

This latter possibility is not as far-fetched as some of our readers might suppose. It could be achieved without too much effort and certainly well within the March 30th time limit. If all of our readers would merely get one ad in any amount, we would be set. From the angle of simple statistics, we would then have raised the \$35,000 which the Educational Scholarship Fund of Ramaz School and the Religious School is seeking.

We have been urging our readers, these past several weeks, to try getting an ad. We are happy to report that some have, and among these are a few to whom this was a brand-new experience. Not only did they help to provide scholarship aid to deserving children, but, as one of them remarked, "I got a terrific kick out of it."

You will shortly receive from the Synagogue Office some communication with regard to the Year Book. Please do not destroy it, or discard it, until you have done what will be requested of you. It will be, essentially, to join the ranks of Year Book workers by turning in just one ad — in whatever amount it should be — before the dead-line is reached. That's just three weeks from today.
