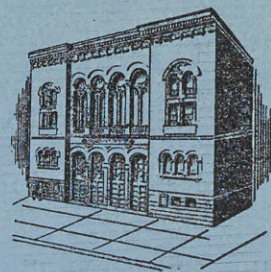

A Happy Passover

PREPARING FOR PASSOVER

There are several important matters that should be borne in mind during the Passover season, and we take this means of bringing them to the attention of our readers.

"Kosher for Passover" —

A label bearing the inscription, "Kosher for Passover" is not necessarily a guarantee that the article so labeled is permissible for Passover use. Unfortunately, there are the unscrupulous who take advantage, and the credulous who fall prey. Whatever food article, therefore, that is purchased for Passover and which require endorsement should indicate that it has the approval of a recognized rabbi or rabbinic organization. When in doubt, phone the Synagogue Office.

Search for Chometz —

On the evening before the eve of Passover (this year, Thursday evening, April 19th), every Jewish home is inspected to make sure that all "chometz" has been removed. Like every religious practice, there is a ceremony connected with this inspection. It is well to observe that ceremony, not alone because it is a religious requirement, but because it affords an opportunity to impress the children of every household.

Sale of Chometz —

The important ritual of "m'chiras chometz", the sale of chometz, must be attended to by Thursday, April 19th. Rabbi Lookstein will be available for this purpose during the pre-Passover week, beginning with Sunday, April 15th. For those who cannot come in person, we provide a form on page 2 which must be properly filled out, signed, and returned to the Rabbi no later than Thursday.

Only at irregular intervals did we report on the progress of this most important Men's Club-sponsored activity — and then, only to thank the young boys and girls who participated in the service for their fine officiating. Yet, unheralded as it was, the Young People's Minyan conducted a regular morning service every Sunday since October, with some fifty and sixty boys and girls not only constituting the congregation, but conducting the entire service from beginning to end.

The morning's activity would begin with the service, at which four young men would be given the opportunity to officiate, and would include a "sermonette" delivered by one of the children. Then the children would enjoy a hearty community breakfast, consisting of the usual Sunday-morning fare, after which an hour or so would be spent in the gymnasium at some athletic activity.

All of this was, naturally, supervised by members of the Religious School staff, but the actual conduct of the service and gym period was entrusted to the capable hands of three college men, themselves "alumni" of the Young People's Minyan: Haskel Lookstein, assisted by Lawrence Kobrin at the service, and by Fred Zuckerman in the athletic period. These three contributed far more than their efforts for three hours Sunday mornings. They served as a source of inspiration for all the children, who felt that this was an activity that was completely theirs, to do with as they

Disposal of Chometz —

No chometz may be eaten after 9:45 a.m. on Friday, April 20th. All chometz should be completely disposed of by 10:45 a.m. that morning.

Service for the First-Born —

It is obligatory upon every first-born who cannot observe the fast on Friday, April 20th, to attend the special service on that day and to participate, at its conclusion, in the light collation that is served. Services for the first-born will be held in the Chapel on Friday, April 20th, as part of the regular morning service which will begin at 7:15.

THE WEEKLY PORTION

Providing an interesting and fitting interlude between Mincha and Ma'ariv services on Saturday evenings, the discussion of the weekly portion, led by Rabbi Sol Roth, has been attracting a large number of worshippers, and has become a highly anticipated weekly feature.

This Saturday afternoon — Shabbat Hagadol — Rabbi Roth will again deliver a dissertation on the portion of the week following the Mincha service. We extend a cordial invitation to residents of our community to be present. A real treat is in store for you.
