Rabbi Lamm will preach this Sabbath at 10:45 a.m. on "STAINED HANDS AND CLOUDED EYES" Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun and its entire family extends a cordial *Bo-achem l'Sholom* to Rabbi and Mrs. Joseph H. Lookstein, who are returning this week from a twomonths' stay in Israel. During the course of their visit, the Looksteins stopped at a number of European cities, but spent the major portion of the summer touring Israel "from Dan to Beersheba."

Although the trip fulfilled a longcherished dream of Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein to visit the Holy Land, it was for a double-barreled purpose that the journey was undertaken this . year: to attend the World Zionist Congress, and to make a tour of inspection of JDC installations on the Continent and in Israel proper.

At the Congress, the Rabbi played a most important role. He was the sole representative of Mizrachi on the Permanent Committee, the most important committee of the Congress. As the first Congress to be convoked since the establishment of the State of Israel, it had a pioneering task in the formulation of Zionist policies *vis-a-vis* the independent State. The Rabbi, as a leader of his party, had an important part in the determination of the new policies.

Among the honors that came to Rabbi Lookstein personally, was his election as Vice-Chairman of World Mizrachi. Elected Chairman was Da-

vid Pinkas, a prominent member of the Knesset.

Guest of Israeli Leaders—

In the course of the Rabbi's visit he conferred with people in every walk of life and of every shade of opinion. He spoke to labor leaders, to members of the Herut, to Mapam and Mapai adherents. Especially significant were his conferences with government officials including Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, Minister of Religious Judah Leib Maimon, Minister of Interior Moshe Shapiro and the Mayor of Jerusalem Shragai.

The Rabbi was the personal house guest of Chief Rabbi Isaac Halevi Herzog with whom he has had a personal friendship of long standing. During these visits with Rabbi Herzog, the Rabbi discussed such matters as the religious court system, and what was being done to adjust the ancient religion to new conditions. Flattering indeed was the Chief Rabbi's invitation to Rabbi Lookstein to spend two months each year in Israel, teaching the art of preaching to young rabbis.

To Discuss Trip in Sermons—

It is impossible to give details in an article of limited scope such as this, of the Rabbi's experiences. In order that these experiences be most meaningful, they would have to be related by the Rabbi personally.

The Rabbi will, therefore, devote the sermons of the next two Sabbaths, September 15th and 22nd, to his Istael trip. The theme of the two talks is "A Pilgrim Views Israel's Progress". The first sermon is entitled, "A Miracle Realistically Appraised"; the second, "Problems and Prospects."

RAMAZ INSTITUTE OPENED FOR ADVANCED HEBREW STUDIES

We welcome the latest addition to our educational family: the Ramaz Institute, which will begin sessions this month.

The Institute is intended to provide the opportunity to high school graduates (who meet the entrance requirements in their Hebrew backgrounds) to continue with their religious studies. The curriculum of the Institute will lead to graduation with a Diploma in Advanced Jewish Studies, which, if properly supplemented, will help the graduate qualify for a license to teach in a Jewish Day School or a Talmud Torah.

The curriculum for this year will include courses in Talmud, Laws, Prophets and Literature. The faculty will be comprised of experienced teachers who are well-known in their fields of Jewish scholarship.

Classes will begin on Monday, September 17th. Sessions will be conducted Monday through Thursday, from 4:00 to 6:35 p.m., in the Ramaz Upper School Building.

ACCLAIM AGAIN GREETS SYNAGOGUE YEAR BOOK

Another in the long series of "feathers in our cap" was added this year when the 1951 Year Book reached the hands of our members and friends during the summer. Reaction was immediate, spontaneous and unanimously favorable, and came from ever so many of the hundreds who received the volume.

Following the general format of previous editions, the 1951 Year Book again contains articles of interest to the reader and to the historian of the future. The Synagogue Year in Review — a resume of all the activities conducted in our buildings — will prove of especial value to the chronicler of years to come, for it summarizes all that transpired in Kehilath Jeshurun, one of the oldest and most important synagogues in the country.

Pictorial Album

Evokes High Praise-

The section called *The Pictorial* Album was pointed to in particular as worthy of the finest comment. It follows the aim of the Year Book as set forth in the Foreword: that this, the eleventh Year Book of the Congregation, "is in every respect a record of the affairs of the Congregation during the year 1950-51." The Album describes pictorially what went on this past year, in over sixty pages of "shots" taken at the building during functions of the Congregation, its affiliates, and its schools.
