RESERVATIONS FOR MEALS IN SUKKAH NOW BEING TAKEN

Arrangements have been completed for holiday meals to be served in our Sukkah during the forthcoming Sukkoth festival. Full-course catered meals will be served Sunday and Monday nights, October 14th and 15th; Monday and Tuesday afternoons, October 15th and 16th; Friday night, October 19th; and Saturday afternoon, October 20th

Plans for Sukkah meals were formulated in order to render the observance of Jewish holidays more meaningful and more beautiful. Our large and beautifully-decorated Sukkah is on the third floor of the Synagogue House, and will be the scene of joyous festivity appropriate to the spirit

of Sukkoth.

The price per plate has been set at a nominal \$5.00. This covers everything that will be required, including gratuities.

To assure yourself of an enjoyable Yom Tov in keeping with the traditional practice of having meals in the Sukkah, we suggest you call the Synagogue office now and place your reservations.

The dead-line for making reservations is Tuesday, October 9th. In order to avoid involved bookkeeping records, all reservations must be accompanied by check.

Provide Yourself With Ethrog and Lulay —

The Sukkoth festival will begin at sundown on Sunday, October 14th. In order to prepare for the holiday, we urge our readers to provide themselves with a Lulav and Ethrog, and to arrange for their acquisition without delay.

There are several reasons why we stress this matter. First and foremost, of course, is that Sukkoth cannot be properly observed without making a daily benediction over these articles. Secondly, the participation of a greater number of worshippers in the pro-

cession in the synagogue, each holding a Lulav and Ethrog, will make for a more impressive ceremony and beautiful service. And we add as a third reason that by making this purchase we are helping our brethren in Israel. Kosher Ethrogim are imported from the groves of Israel where so many depend for their livelihood on the sale of these citrus fruits.

You can thus accomplish many ends by purchasing a Lulav and Ethrog. Our Ritual Director, Joseph E. Adler, will be only too happy to be of assistance to you. A call to the Synagogue Office will bring the desired results.

SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES

Many worshippers will be with us for the first time these High Holidays. For their benefit, as well as for the benefit of our regular worshippers, we make known the following ordinances:

(1) Admission to the services during the High Holidays will be by card only. This rule will be strictly enforced.

(2) There will be no vacant seats during the holidays. We therefore ask our worshippers not to bring children to the Synagogue unless seats have been reserved for them. To do otherwise will crowd and inconvenience those who have a right to their seats.

(3) The doors will be closed during the sermon. Please be in your seat before the sermon begins.

(4) Please join in the congregational singing.

(5) Conversation of any kind is forbidden during the services. Proper decorum is essential for dignified worship.

(6) Please do not remove the Talith, or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of the services.

(7) Our worshippers are invited to take advantage of the checking facilities on the main floor, for the checking of hats and coats. White skull caps are available for the use of all male worshippers. They may be obtained at the checking counters.

(8) Uniform Prayer Books are available to all. A Prayer Book will be found on every seat. At the close of services please leave the Prayer Book on your seat.

(9) A House of Worship should at all times command the respect of every Jew, particularly during the days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Worshippers' attire should be conservative and subdued in keeping with the sanctity of the House of God and the solemnity of the season.

(10) Kohanim who participate in the Priestly Benediction are requested to wear white sneakers during the brief ceremony. These sneakers, bearing the

name of the owner, may be brought to the synagogue on Rosh Hashanah eve. They will be held for you and will be made available in time for the Benediction. This uniformity of dress will enhance the impressiveness of the ritual.

High Holiday Ushers -

Under the chairmanship of George Jacobs, a committee of ushers has been appointed to serve during the holiday season. A charming group of young ladies will act as usherettes in the ladies section.

Members on this Board of Ushers are performing a labor of love. They do their job voluntarily and devotedly. It is expected that our worshippers will cooperate with them in carrying out all the regulations and procedures designed to make our services more dignified, more impressive and more inspiring.

TO WORSHIPPERS AT THE AUXILIARY SERVICE

Steps have been taken to assure the worshippers at our Auxiliary Services of a service that will meet the high standards which we have always maintained. In charge of the service will be Rabbi Norman Lamm, who is already known to our congregants, and Cantor Saul H. Klausner will officiate.

These services will be conducted in the Auditorium of the Synagogue House. In order to make access to the Auditorium as easy as possible, we ask worshippers who hold tickets to the Auxiliary Services to use the entrance of the Synagogue House, 125 East 85th Street, rather than the entrance of the Main Synagogue.
