# STANDING ROOM ONLY GREETS RABBI AT FORUM MEETING APPEARANCE

500 Hear Lecture Sponsored by Men's Club and Sisterhood

The auditorium last Tuesday evening was quite literally packed to the rafters with an eager group of some 500 men and women. The occasion was the Rabbi's lecture on "Paris, Munich, Rome and Jerusalem — A Tale of Four Cities", presented before a joint meeting sponsored by the Men's Club and the Sisterhood of the congregation.

• The Rabbi, who had just returned from a ten week stay on the continent and in Israel, took the audience through the magic carpet of his words on a whirlpool tour. The four cities that he chose to depict were not mere-

 ly important in themselves but, the Rabbi explained, "represented types and symbols that prevail through the world of our day." He characterized his hegira from West to Near East as a progression from amnesia, to amnesty, to passivity, to re-birth.

With quick strokes and vivid imagery he painted a Paris "that has forgotten — or does not care to remember"; a Munich, now one of the most prosperous cities in Europe, which was the symbol of "unrepentance, of pardon for the criminal;" a Rome of unnatural calm and of artificial peace; and, finally the Rabbi spoke of the new Jerusalem, bursting with energy and the spirit of renascence.

The Rabbi recounted the personal experiences of his tour. He quoted facts and figures. He named personalities and places. As a member of the Administration Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee he was commissioned by that organization to make an official inspection of their installations. He was thus in a particularly good position to see "inside" the countries he visited. And, indeed, he presented no mere bird's eye view. Those who attended and heard the Rabbi speak received a sober and considered analysis of the world dilemma which we are all facing and of the position of the Jew in that dilemma.

The experience was a rewarding one both emotionally and intellectually. That it provided more than the usual "food for thought" was evidenced in the heated discussions and earnest debates that were in evidence during the socializing that followed the lecture proper. The office of the synagogue has already received considerable comment on the evening and we know that those who attended this Forum will not soon forget it.

### MEMORIAL WINDOWS INSTALLED
