An academic Convocation, marking the opening of sessions in the Kehilath Jeshurun Institute for Adult Studies for the year 1951-52, will be held on Monday evening, November 19th, at 8:00 o'clock, in the Social Hall. The proceedings will be presided over by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, and as guest speaker for the evening, we have invited Prof. Salo W. Baron, who will speak on "Jewish Survival: an Historic Challenge."

A world-renowned scholar, Dr. Baron is professor of Jewish History at Columbia University, and the author of numerous scholarly works. A noted sociologist, Dr. Baron has held the chair of Jewish History at Columbia for over twenty years. For many years he served as visiting lecturer of history at the Graduate School for Jewish Social Work in New York and also at the Rochester-Colgate Divinity School. He is a fellow of the American Academy for Jewish Research, and served as its president from 1940 to 1943.

Currently the editor of the quarterly, "Jewish Social Studies", our guest speaker has had many of his writings published. These include "A Social and Religious History of the Jews, in three volumes; "The Jewish Community", in three volumes; "Modern Nationalism and Religion", and many others which are regarded as authoritative in their fields.

Members of our congregational family have had numerous occasions in the past to hear Dr. Baron speak from our platform. Those who attended these meetings, need no further introduction to our guest speaker, and no special urging to join us on the 19th. To all our readers, we extend a warm invitation to attend the Convocation, and to bring their friends with them.

### RABBI LOOKSTEIN PRESIDES AT MIZRACHI CONVENTION

Rabbi Lookstein is spending this week at the Mizrachi Convention in Atlantic City. As President of the Mizrachi National Education Committee he is presiding at the sessions of that group at which are expected several hundred leading educators from all parts of the country.

In his capacity as Chairman of the Executive Committee he is also scheduled to address the opening meeting of the four-day conference of the Mizrachi Organization of America as well as to chair several sessions later in the convention.

Prior to the convention itself the Rabbi spoke before a meeting of the Mizrachi Women's Organization on the subject of "Religion in Israel."

### RELIGIOUS SCHOOL OPENS CLASS FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A new class in the Religious School has been opened for boys and girls attending high school whose programs do not permit them to attend a class during the regular afternoon hours of the Religious School. The class, to be known as a Seminar in Religious Studies for High School Students, will meet every Wednesday from 5:00 to 6:30 p.m., and will have as its instructor Rabbi Lookstein.

The group was organized earlier this week when the Rabbi met with several high school students who, until recently were pupils in our Religious School, and who evinced a keen interest in continuing with their Hebrew studies at some time that would not conflict with their high school programs. The class will have as its primary aim further instruction in subjects of Jewish learning, but it is hoped that it will form the nucleus of a young social group which will also become a regular club activity.

The first session of the Seminar will take place on Wednesday, November 21st, at 5:00 o'clock. From that date on, we expect to see a large number of high school boys and girls meet every Wednesday evening to continue their Hebrew education under the guidance of the Rabbi.
