HISTORIC CANDELABRA AGAIN ON EXHIBIT AT SYNAGOGUE

Amid the gaily-decorated lobbies of the Synagogue House, reflecting the festive character of Chanukah, visitors to our building will notice a six-foot, bronze candelabra, on display throughout the eight days of the festival. This beautiful work of art has a fascinating history behind it, in which we know you will be interested:

The candelabra was presented to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee by the Jewish Community of Budapest, Hungary in 1948, in recognition of the services rendered by the JDC in rebuilding the Jewish community. Prior to its arrival in the United States, the menora was for years used in the leading Hungarian synagogue. During the war and occupation, it was hidden for safe-keeping, then recovered after liberation, and presented "with grateful remembrance" to the JDC.

We know that visitors to our building will be thrilled to view this beautiful and historic candelabra, made available to us by the JDC, representing the touching gift of an appreciative community. At this service, we will dedicate the memorial windows, tablets and plaques that have been inscribed since the last memorial service was conducted several years ago.

The service will be a most impressive one. It will be conducted by Rabbi Lookstein with the assistance of Cantor Gertler. For the occasion, we have engaged the services of a choir under the direction of Oscar Julius, which will render vocal selections in keeping with the solemnity and the dignity that the service demands.

Invitations will be in the mails within the next few days. A special letter
has been sent to those people who
arranged for the inscription of a memorial, asking that they let us know the
names of the guests they would like
to have invited in their name. To these
people, in particular, we should like
to direct this request: please return
your guest list as soon as possible.
Your cooperation in this matter will
be greatly appreciated.

Incidentally, if you have been planning to have a plaque inscribed in memory of a dear one, we would suggest that you give the matter serious thought **now** so that the plaque may be ready in time for this Memorial Service. Call the Synagogue Office for information.
