STUDENTS WILL AGAIN READ MEGILLAH AT PURIM SERVICES; PURIM PARTY SUNDAY EVENING TO BE OUTSTANDING AFFAIR

The festive holiday of Purim will be ushered in this year on Monday evening, March 10th, when another capacity congregation is expected to attend the Ma'ariv service at which Cantor Hyman Gertler will officiate. Following the service, the story of Purim will be re-told through the reading of the Megillah, which will again be entrusted to the capable hands of ten young men, pupils of Ramaz School and our afternoon Religious School, whose rendition will be accompanied by the customary percussion instruments wielded by the children who will participate in the service.

The practice of having our own young men read the Purim Scroll has become one of the highly anticipated events of the congregational year. Introduced several years ago, it has received city-wide acclaim, and has been

instrumental in bringing to our Synagogue larger and larger congregations with every passing year. This Purim eve, those who will read the Megillah are: Philip Berger, Joshua Berman, Fred Ehrman, Franklin Holzer, Joseph Kalb, Harvey Leifert, Shalom Pechenik, Frank Sadinoff, Morton Schatzman and Robert Vigoda.

Purim is one of those holidays that appeal to young and old alike. We will be happy to welcome all at our service Monday evening. Special arrangements have been made for the children. They are asked to assemble at 5:00 o'clock in the Auditorium, where they will receive the traditional noise-makers and be escorted to a reserved section in the Synagogue.

200 HEAR TALK ON MAIMONIDES AT SUPPER-LECTURE

An audience that almost reached SRO proportions — over two hundred men, women and collegiates — attended the second Supper-lecture last Sunday evening, when Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein spoke, as masterfully as ever, on "The Guide for the Perplexed — Maimonides as a Practical Philosopher". The size of the audience virtually overwhelmed us; those who were present, in turn, were decidedly overwhelmed by the Rabbi's delineation of that all-time Jewish great, Maimonides, his works and his philosophy.

The Rabbi described the beginnings of Maimonides - his early youth and family background - and spoke of his competence, at an unusually early age, in the fields of languages, mathematics, astronomy, rabbinics and philosophy. The career of the Rambam as physician to the court of the Sultan, Saladin, was also described, and, in this connection the Rabbi pointed out that in spite of his preoccupation with the health and wellbeing of the Sultan and his extensive household, Maimonides nevertheless found time to devote to scholarly pursuits.

Rabbi Lookstein spent some time in reviewing the many works of Maimonides — his medical books, Halachic output, and his "magnum opus"; "The Guide for the Perplexed". This latter work was analyzed in detail, as to the subject matters treated and the views of Maimonides on such topics as the attributes of God, Biblical prophecies and visions, the nature of evil, Divine Providence, and the like. The impact of the "Guide" on all subsequent philosophers, Jew and non-Jew alike, was also touched upon.

In brief, we were treated to an insight into Maimonides that could not be duplicated anywhere, and the likes of which we will never again encounter.

The third Supper-Lecture will be held on Sunday evening, March 16th, at which time Rabbi Lookstein will speak on "The Zohar: the Jewish Mind's Flight into Mysticism." Another treat is in store for those who will attend. Please note: no reservations whatever will be accepted after Wednesday, March 12th.

APPRECIATION FROM RABBI LOOKSTEIN

I have been delighted, gratified and flattered by the splendid turn-out to the two Supper Lectures thus far held. I am deeply appreciative of the interest demonstrated by those who came in such large numbers. Especially am I pleased with the attendance of so many young people. It is heartwarming to any rabbi to witness a manifestation of such intellectual curiosity on the part of his congregation, of such devotion to Jewish learning and such eagerness for Jewish knowledge.

A number of those who attended, I am informed, would have welcomed an opportunity to ask questions on the subjects treated. I regret exceedingly that the material that had to be covered did not allow for a question-and-answer period. I do, however, promise that for the next lecture such a period will be provided. The lecture will take approximately one hour and, following it, at least one half hour will be devoted to questions on all of the lectures thus far held.
