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**OVER 500 ATTEND SUPPER LECTURE SERIES  
Rabbi Discusses Judah Ha-Levi in Final Talk**

The fifth and most successful of the Annual Supper Lecture Series came to a rousing climax last Sunday when the Rabbi discussed Judah Ha-Levi as poet, philosopher and nationalist. Speaking before a packed house, in this last lecture the Rabbi gave a brief survey of mediaeval Jewish poetry and of Ha-Levi as its finest product. Reading in his own lyrical fashion he "played on the harp" of the song of this great poet whom Heine so fittingly dubbed "the kissed of God."

Then the Rabbi went on to guide his listeners through the scholastic shoals and philosophical paradoxes of Ha-Levi's philosophy as illustrated in the "Kuzari." He demonstrated how this giant of the Spanish Golden Age was a poet and patriot when a philosopher; a patriot and philosopher when a poet, and always a philosopher and poet when a patriot. He showed how his yearning for Israel and his love for his people permeated every fibre of his being and every line of his work.

Finally, the Rabbi linked this sweet singer of Israel to the general stream of Jewish culture represented by the subjects of his three preceding lectures on Saadia, on Maimonides and on the Zohar. "Saadia," said the Rabbi, "was the voice of power of might, the divine warrior; . . . Maimonides was the still penetrating voice of reason, of logic; . . . the "Zohar" was not a voice but an echo, an echo of other worldliness, of a people tired of din and tumult seeking serenity; . . . and Ha-Levi was the voice of song, calm and reassuring, sweet and consoling: Four major themes in the eternal symphony of the Jew."

On this high point a memorable series came to a close. Attended each session by hundreds of men and women who sat enthralled and went away inspired, this activity is a forthright answer to those who question the feasibility of Adult Education as well as those "middle-brows" who mock the intellectual capacity of the American Jewish community.

## YOUNG PEOPLE'S MINYAN TO CONDUCT CLOSING SERVICE ON APRIL 20th

The Young People's Minyan will hold its last service of the year on Sunday morning, April 20th, at 9:30 o'clock, in the Chapel. Deviating somewhat from its usual practice of having one of the youthful worshippers deliver a short talk, the Minyan has invited Rabbi Lookstein to speak and to bring the "season" to an auspicious close.

Only on occasions did we report on the progress of this important Men's Club-sponsored activity — and then, only to thank the young boys and girls who participated in the service for their fine officiating. Yet, unheralded as it was, the Young People's Minyan conducted a regular morning service every Sunday since October, with some fifty and sixty boys and girls not only constituting the congregation, but conducting the entire service from beginning to end.

The morning's activity would begin with the service, at which four young men would be given the opportunity to officiate, and would include a "ser-

monette" delivered by one of the children. Then the children would enjoy a hearty community breakfast, consisting of the usual Sunday-morning fare, after which an hour or so would be spent in the gymnasium at some athletic activity.

All of this was, naturally, supervised by members of the Religious School staff, but the actual conduct of the service and gym period was entrusted to the capable hands of Haskel Lookstein, himself and alumnus of the Minyan, who contributed far more than mere effort for three hours Sunday mornings. He served as a source of inspiration for all the children who felt that this was an activity that was completely theirs, to do with as they saw fit. And you would be amazed at the religious and educational results they achieved!

As we prepare to bid "au revoir" to the Minyan until next year, we extend a cordial invitation to all our readers of 'teen age to attend next Sunday's service. We know you will enjoy the experience, and we should like to have you join us in giving the Minyan a truly "royal sendoff."

An equally cordial welcome is extended to the adults. We assure you of an experience that will bring you great pride and satisfaction — one you will be talking (and boasting) about for a long time.

The service starts at 9:30, and is held in the Chapel.
