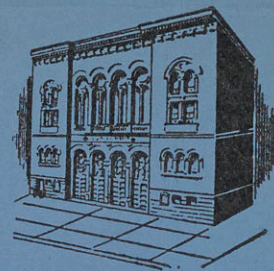

Arrangements have been completed for holiday meals to be served in our Sukkah during the forthcoming Sukkoth festival. Full-course catered meals will be served Friday and Saturday nights, October 3rd and 4th; and Saturday and Sunday afternoons, October 4th and 5th.

Plans for Sukkah meals were formulated in order to render the observance of Jewish holidays more meaningful and more beautiful. Our large and beautifully-decorated Sukkah is on the third floor of the Synagogue House, and will be the scene of joyous festivity appropriate to the spirit of Sukkoth.

The price per plate has been set at a nominal \$6.00. This covers everything that will be required, including gratuities.

To assure yourself of an enjoyable Yom Tov in keeping with the traditional practice of having meals in the Sukkah, we suggest you call the Synagogue office now and place your reservations.

The dead-line for making reservations is Tuesday, September 30th. In order to avoid involved book-keeping records, all reservations must be accompanied by check.

**Provide Yourself
With Ethrog and Lulav —**

The Sukkoth festival will begin at sundown on Friday, October 3rd. In order to prepare for the holiday, we urge our readers to provide themselves with a Lulav and Ethrog, and to arrange for their acquisition without delay.

There are several reasons why we stress this matter. First and foremost, of course, is that Sukkoth cannot be properly observed without making a daily benediction over these articles. Secondly, the participation of a greater number of worshippers in the pro-

Registration in Religious School to Close

Jerome H. Rosenblum, principal of the afternoon Religious School has announced that sessions for the new term are already under way on a regular schedule, and the pupils who have enrolled have begun the year's work. He pointed out that those parents who have boys or girls of Talmud Torah age, should lose no time in registering them in our Religious School in order that they may be able to keep up with the progress of their class.

The decision to open Sunday School classes for youngsters of the

age of 5 through 7 was most warmly received. As a new venture in the educational program of the Religious School, this feature has attracted many inquiries from interested parents and has resulted in a fair number of registrants. Indications are that these primary grade classes will be organized immediately after the holiday season.

We cannot help but feel that those residents of our community who have eligible youngsters who are not attending a Talmud Torah, are doing

Another important announcement was made after the Executive Board meeting last Tuesday. This disclosure was with respect to the Men's Club-sponsored Boy Scout Troop, about to start its program for the new year.

Owing to the pressure of personal affairs, Martin Klein, who served as Scoutmaster since the inception of our troop, asked to be relieved of this post. Regretfully, the Board accepted Mr. Klein's resignation, but was heartened by the designation of Dr. Ned Wachtel as the new Scoutmaster. Dr. Wachtel, who served as the leader of our Cub Pack, has manifested not only the qualifications that the position requires, but an eagerness to work with the young boys and a willingness to devote his time and energies to the scouting program. SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES

Many worshippers will be with us for the first time these High Holidays. For their benefit, as well as for the benefit of our regular worshippers, we make known the following ordinances:

1. Admission to the services during the High Holidays will be by card only. This rule will be strictly enforced.
2. There will be no vacant seats during the holidays. We therefore ask our worshippers not to bring children to the Synagogue unless seats have been reserved for them. To do otherwise will crowd and inconvenience those who have a right to their seats.
3. Worshippers who find their seats occupied will please call the attention of the ushers to this fact.
4. Very young children who are incapable of proper conduct should not be brought to the synagogue.
5. The doors will be closed during the sermon. Please be in your seat before the sermon begins.
6. Please join in the congregational singing.
7. Conversation of any kind is forbidden during the services. Proper decorum is essential for dignified worship.
8. Please do not remove the Talith, or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of the services.
9. Our worshippers are invited to take advantage of the checking facilities on the main floor, for the checking of hats and coats. White skull caps are available for the use of all male worshippers. They may be obtained at the checking counters.
10. Uniform Prayer Books are available to all. At the close of services please leave the Prayer Book on your seat.
11. A House of Worship should be at all times command the respect of every Jew, particularly during the days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Worshippers' attire should be conservative and subdued in keeping with the sanctity of the House of God and the solemnity of the season.

themselves and the children a gross injustice. Especially since there exists in their vicinity a school that has so much to offer their sons and daughters — a school that has been pointed to as a model for others to emulate. This is not an idle boast on our part: ask the parents of any of our pupils or former pupils, or ask an official educational agency like the Jewish Education Committee.

We are happy to have children come to our school from veritably all parts of the city — from the Upper Bronx to Lower Manhattan. But we cannot help feeling that there are ever so many boys and girls who live in our neighborhood and who *belong* with us, but who, for some reason or other, are not numbered among our student body.

You may know of one — some boy or girl whose parents may, perhaps, not even know of the existence of our school. You can be instrumental in rendering a great service to that youngster by referring his mother or father to us. The school office will take over from that point.
