The Service will be held this Sunday, regardless of weather conditions. A tent has been constructed at the Cemetery for the convenience of those who will join us in the great mitzvah of Chinuch Beth Hakvoroth.

Supper-Meeting Most Successful —

What was conceded to be one of the finest get-togethers of the Men's Club within the last few years, took place Tuesday evening when the organization held its first Supper-Meeting of the season in the Social Hall. What helped to make the meeting the success it was, was not only the friendly atmosphere that prevailed and the fine dinner that was served, but the excellent talk delivered by our guest speaker, Saul J. Lance, and the response that his remarks elicited from the audience.

Speaking on the subject, "Orthodox Jewry in a Divided Jewish Community," Mr. Lance discussed the controversy that is currently raging about the Federation of Jewish Charities with regard to the establishment of the Long Island Jewish Hospital. Taking a frankly partisan position, Mr. Lance analyzed the history of Federation, its aims and the scope of its activities, and described briefly the attacks that have been leveled against this fund-raising organization by those who disagree with the policies of the trustees of the aforementioned hospital.

The floor was then opened for a general discussion of the matter, and the diversity of opinions expressed, as well as the warmth with which some of these thoughts were conveyed, attested to the clarity of Mr. Lance's analysis and to the concern that has been given to this question by the members of the Men's Club.

Rabbi Lookstein contributed in no small way to the success of the meeting, when, in his customary closing remarks, he gave his views on the subject. The Rabbi touched on the reli-

The following is a letter from Sam Heyman, the son of our dear members, Mr. and Mrs. William Heyman, who is stationed in Anchorage, Alaska. The letter speaks for itself:

30 Sept. 52

Dear Folks:

I had a successful fast yesterday. We broke the fast with a free dinner of salami, lox, herring, liverwurst, cake, tea, coffee and grape juice. It was provided by the Jewish Welfare Board in Seattle.

We stopped services at 1:30 and started them again at 3:30. Sundown was stated at 6:00. No announcement was made. I broke the fast with a Martini while the buffet was being prepared. No cream soda available.

The Rabbi, an army chaplain, caught a 2:00 plane for Fairbanks and Ladd Field to finish services there and have the dinner with them. There is only one Jewish Chaplain for the two bases, which means for all Alaska. He is kept busy. Maybe you can't ride on Yum Kippur, but you sure can fly!!! This northland requires laws of its own. The Hadassah here is known as the World's Farthest North Hadassah.
