

"CHAIM WEIZMANN — A TRIBUTE AND AN EVALUATION

BY A RELIGIOUS ZIONIST"

The 1952-53 season of the Kehilath Jeshurun Institute for adult studies began Monday evening, when classes in the subjects offered met to start on the year's curriculum. Classes in Elementary and more advanced Hebrew, in Talmud, and in Liturgical Procedures — the content of which appeared in the Institute brochure recently sent to our readers — met with their respective teachers in the Synagogue House to embark on what we know will be a successful year of cultural advancement.

The hour-long study periods were followed by a Convocation marking the opening of the Institute, which was held in the Social Hall. The guest speaker at the Convocation was Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, who spoke on "A Religious View of Jewish Culture" in honor of Jewish Book Month currently being commemorated. The Rabbi discussed the major differences between a secularist's view of culture and that of the religious-minded Jew: which outlook brings richer and more profitable results; and which viewpoint stands the better chance of surviving. He urged his audience to adhere to the time-honored Jewish practice of assembling large home libraries and encouraging the publication of books of Jewish content, as a means of furthering culture

A season-long series of lectures, devoted to the American Jewish Community, will begin this Monday evening at 9:00 o'clock, in the Social Hall — following the regular instruction classes which meet at 8:00. The first four lectures of the series will be devoted to the Historical Background of the American Jewish Community, and will be treated by Dr. Hyman B. #### Supper Meeting Well Received —

The Supper Meeting held last Tuesday evening was unusually well received, what with a fine attendance of Men's Club members and their guests present to enjoy the gettogether. Our guest speaker was our esteemed member, Prof. Maurice Finkelstein, who spoke to us on the subject, "Psychoanalysis and Religion."

Discussing a subject that, in recent years, has been the focal point of heated controvsery, Prof. Finkelstein took a most detached and objective view. He pointed out those features which both psychoanalysis and religion have in common, and those in which they differ. He referred, for example, to the fact that both areas are alike in that neither is based on logic and reason; they are different in their outlook on the relationship of man to his fellow men.

The analysis of the subject as treated by Prof. Finkelstein gave rise to an interesting and varied questionand-answer period, in which a good number of those present participated. Following our usual custom, Rabbi Lookstein was called upon to offer his remarks on the topic, and the Rabbi spoke from quite a different angle. He said that in years to come, psychoanalysis and religion will enjoy the same type of relationship that today exists between medicine and religion — that they will be recognized as co-existing for the benefit of mankind and that, far from conflicting with each other, they will complement one another. The psychoanalyst will recognize the importance of religion to man's well-being, and the religious teacher will realize that psychoanalysis has its place in helping produce a happier and healthier man.

Only one question was not publicly answered, when the meeting was adjourned: when would the next Supper Meeting take place and who would be the speaker. Otherwise, our guests took their leave Tuesday evening

Dr. Hyman B. Grinstein

A recognized authority on the subject, Dr. Grinstein is the author of The Rise of the Jewish Community of New York and has contributed many articles on this theme to numerous scholarly journals. A graduate of Columbia University, from which he received his Doctorate, our guest speaker is an outstanding member of the Jewish Academy of Arts and Sciences and the American Jewish Historical Society. Dr. Grinstein is currently working on another book, The Expansion of the Jewish Community of New York, which, we know, will become the "standard" book on the subject, as did his first volume.

The topic to be discussed this Monday evening is "The Jew Comes to America" — taking in the immigration and settlement of the Jews in the United States from the earliest times until 1900. The talk will be followed by a question-and-answer period, so that our "students" may have an opportunity to raise questions or to contribute to the discussion.
