MARCH 1st DEAD-LINE SET FOR 1953 YEAR BOOK ADS List of Ad-Getters Growing Steadily

Jules Podell, chairman of the 1953 Year Book, has announced that the deadline date for the 1953 drive — the date by which all ads must be in the hands of the synagogue office — has been set at March 1st. This year, Mr. Podell announced, it will be our aim to publish the Year Book long before the summer

months. It is therefore necessary that all ads be in by the dead-line date.

"THE JEW AS A JOINER"

Last Monday, Dr. Abraham G. Duker delivered his third lecture in the series on the American Jewish Community. He discussed the Jew as a "joiner", and delineated the role of the "landsmanschaft" and the lodge in the process of Americanization. Skillfully he traced the changing pattern in Jewish organizational life, giving statistics and citing concrete examples. Especially noteworthy was his analysis of the place of religion, sociologically, in the culture of the Jew and its effect on organizational life.

The final lecture of this part of the series will be given on Monday, February 2nd. At that time, Dr. Duker will discuss, "The MacIver Report: a Case Study in Community Organization." Dr. Duker is an authority on the subject and is the author of an excellent analysis of the MacIver Report—one that has aroused almost as much comment as the Report itself. We cannot too strongly urge our readers to avail themselves of the excellent opportunity to hear a first-rate, scholarly discussion of a problem of prime importance.

Simultaneously, Mr. Podell disclosed that, almost without exception, Year Book workers of former years are continuing to support this year's drive. In addition to those listed in last week's BULLETIN, these include Jack Buvitt, William B. Fischberg, Frederick Margareten, Isadore Schlang and Aaron J. Simon. The list is, of course, most incomplete; forthcoming issues will record additional names.

Another bright note was struck with the announcement that there are a goodly number of newcomers to Year Book work cooperating in the effort, many of them new members of the congregation. Among them are Jack Berman, Al Feiner and Oscar Perlberger (who have already turned in appreciable amounts) and many others who have interested themselves in the Educational Scholarship Fund and are working toward getting ads for the Year Book.

The Time Is Now -

With the dead-line just a scant five weeks off, the time to do Year Book work is *now*. Putting it off for some date in the future will only jeopardize
