FATHER-AND-SON MINYAN TO CONDUCT CLOSING SERVICE SUNDAY MORNING

The Father-and-Son Minyan will hold its concluding service of the year this Sunday morning, April 26th, at 9:30 o'clock, in the Chapel. To bring its season to an auspicious close, the Minyan has invited Rabbi Lookstein to speak at the service.

We sometimes become boastful when we talk about this Men's Clubsponsored activity; please attribute it not to immodesty on our part, but to the pride which we take in the fact that, week in and week out, a fine group of our teen-age boys turns out to do what we feel is an outstanding job in a vital area of Jewish life. The young men are learning to become "at home" with the morning synagogue service — something that many of their elders are, for one reason or another, unfamiliar with. Not only do our "Minyanaires" participate in the service; they conduct it in its entirety, and can lead it as well as men two and three times their age. Further, thanks to the efforts of Haskel Lookstein, the young man in charge of the Minyan, our boys are introduced to the background, history and reason of the prayers and of the observances of the synagogue rituals that take place during a service.

We know that those who joined our roster of Patrons during the course of the past year, are as proud of the Minyan as we are. The two or three services that these Patrons attended were truly experiences that they enjoyed and will long remember. And we want our Patrons to know that
