### A Happy Shevuoth

## BOARD APPROVES AIR-CONDITIONING OF SYNAGOGUE Sets \$60,000 Quota for Project; \$25,000 Already Pledged

### SHEVUOTH IN THE SYNAGOGUE

Shevuoth, the Feast of Weeks, commemorates the giving of the Ten Commandments on Mt. Sinai. It is also known as *Chag Habikkurim*, the Festival of First Fruits — a joyous occasion in ancient Palestine, an even more joyous occasion in the new State of Israel.

On Wednesday morning, the first day of Shevuoth, the scriptural reading will include the Ten Commandments. This will be preceded by the chanting of *Akdomos* by the Rabbi and the congregation.

On Thursday, the second day of the festival, the Book of Ruth will be read, and Yizkor services recited. The Book of Remembrance, which the Congregation publishes annually, and in which are recorded the names of those in whose memory a Yizkor offering was made, will be made available to our worshippers at these Memorial services.

Shevuoth is the last major festival of the year — the third of the Shalosh Regalim. As the Festival of the Torah, it bids us to re-dedicate ourselves to the teachings and traditions of our faith. By our presence in the synagogue on the holiday, we affirm our loyalty to the Torah.

Max J. Etra, president of the Congregation, has announced the decision of the Board of Trustees to embark on a project of air-conditioning the Synagogue building, and the setting of a \$60,000 quota for the 1953-54 Annual Synagogue Appeal to finance the installation. Mr. Etra also disclosed that at a meeting of the Board of Trustees, which was held at the home of Rabbi Lookstein Tuesday evening, the sum of \$25,000 was pledged by those present. Tuesday's meeting was the first of a series of get-togethers which will be held at the Rabbi's home, to which will be invited the members of the Congregation, so that the entire venture may be brought directly to our membership and discussed in detail.

The matter of air-conditioning was presented to the Board by the House Committee, consisting of Aaron J. Simon, Chairman; Hyman I. Cohen and Alexander Gross, which had made initial studies of the installation. Following the Board's approval, the Committee engaged the services of a heating and ventilating consultant, who has made a survey of conditions in our building, and is preparing the necessary plans and specifications for the air-conditioning system, to be submitted to contractors for bids. The first unit of the installation will cover the Chapel and Social Hall, where a cooling system will add greatly to the comfort of our worshippers and our guests, and will enhance the "usa-bility" of these beautifully-appointed

"An improvement such as this," said Mr. Etra, "will fill a sorely-felt need in our building. I am certain that our members realize the urgency of the project, and will support it

### FINAL SERVICE SATURDAY
