An audience that packed the Locust Street Theater to the eaves, last night, spent the evening in a state of almost continuous laughter.

The reason was principally a tiny, rotund and altogether captivating little lady who is a commedienne. Like Scaramouche, she "was born with a gift for laughter and a sense that the world is mad."

Her name is Josephine Hull and the world of "The Solid Gold Cadillac," which is the title of the show, is certainly mad—in a nice way, of course. George S. Kaufman, late of Bucks County, and Howard Teichmann, the authors, have seen to that.

All of which is a roundabout way of saying that this new satirical comedy, here on its way to Broadway, is one

of the funniest shows this town has seen for many a day.

Big Business on the Rack

Mrs. Hull is Mrs. Laura Partridge in the play, an exactress of bit parts who is eking out an existence on the proceeds of ten shares of General Products, Inc., one of the biggest corporations in these United States.

Mrs. Partridge, in a moment of inspiration induced by reading her horoscope and finding herself under a favorable sign of the zodiac, attends a stockholders' meeting and starts asking questions. They are easy questions; like: What is the chairman of the board's salary? Just what does he do to earn it? And how much time does he spend at work?

Washington to the Rescue

She is an earnest and naive little lady, and keeps on asking about things until the board finally has a bright idea. They give her a job as liaison officer at \$150 a week (they tried to get her for \$75 but she upped them) between the corporation (it makes everything from bobby pins to army tanks) and the stockholders (several millions of them.)

From then on, little Mrs. Partridge begins to heap up the water until the corporation finds it too hot for comfort. It

wouldn't be fair to give all the ramifications of Mrs. Partridge's adventures as she begins throwing her monkey-wrench into the works but, take it from me, you'll scarcely ever stop laughing.

Particularly, among many other things, when she goes to Washington, on the house, to try to wangle contracts out of the government to bolster declining business, but only manages to start a federal suit and make headlines in the newspapers, which is what she loves—remember she was an actress.

All this is told with that keen satire for which Mr. Kaufman is noted, and some innovations in stage shows; such as real TV news commentators and sidewalk interviews with those concerned—which happens to be Mrs. Partridge and a Washington Big Shot.

What Is It?

As to the play in general—well, it isn't a play, but that's all that's the matter with it. Call it a fantasy, a comedy, a farce, a satire, anything; and you'll be both right and wrong. It's just great fun all the way.

Well, that's about the works; with one last word of warning: Don't go to the Locust during the next two weeks if you have a fever blister or a cracked lip—you'll regret it.
