MAURICE SAMUEL TO SPEAK AT THANKSGIVING SERVICE **Silbermintz Choir to Participate**

The Annual Thanksgiving Services of the Congregation will be held this year on Thursday morning, November 26th, at 11 o'clock in the Synagogue. These services, which spiritualize the holiday of Thanksgiving, have enjoyed a wide and enviable reputation for their impressiveness and for the high calibre of the guest speakers who have addressed them.

Our guest speaker, this year, who is well known to the members of our Congregation, will be Mr. Maurice Samuel, famous author, publicist and translator. A choir, under the direc-

ADULT INSTITUTE CLASSES INAUGURATED

Sessions in the Kehilath Jeshurun Institute got under way for the 1953-54 school year last Monday evening, November 9th. Classes in elementary and advanced Hebrew, in Talmud, and in Liturgical Procedures-the contents of which appeared in the Institute Brochure sent to our readers-met with their respective instructors to embark on what we know will be a year of successful cultural advancement.

The hour long study period was followed by the opening lecture in our new lecture series "The Why's and Wherefore's of Jewish Practices". Our lecturer, Rabbi Gilbert Klaperman, will conduct the series over a period of seven weeks. In this, his opening session, Rabbi Klaperman gave a masterful introduction to Jewish practices. He pointed out the various sources of Jewish Law and how historically these

laws were implemented as practices fulfilling the basic emotional and intellectual needs of the Jews. Religious practices were conceived as lending poetry to daily living and acting as guides and reminders in the achievement of a richer and more meaningful life. Those present responded with warmth and enthusiasm to the introductory lecture and look forward with keen anticipation to the coming sessions, during which specific practices will be discussed.

Rabbi Klaperman is one of the outstanding younger Orthodox Rabbis and is a graduate of Yeshiva College and of Yeshiva's rabbinical school. He is at present Rabbi of Congregation Beth Shalom in Lawrence, L. I. He formerly lectured in Comparative Religion at the State University of (Continued on page 2)

tion of Seymour Silbermintz, will assist Cantor Gertler in officiating at the Services, which will be conducted by Rabbi Lookstein.

Mr. Samuel has carved for himself a unique niche in the life and literature of the Jewish people. As his "lifeassignment", he has devoted the ma-jor part of his talents as writer and lecturer to the transmission and interpretation of Jewish values to the English-speaking world. His three major interests have been the making and realization of the Jewish State, the influence on Jewry of the Yiddish-speaking civilization of Europe, and the social and ideological relations between Jew and Gentile.

Mr. Samuel has traveled widely in America, Europe and Africa, sojourning among far-flung Jewish communities. He lived for many years in Palestine, and now makes frequent and extended visits to Israel. In his books and lectures he is concerned with the world of today, and with the past only as it manifests itself in actual living forces which are moulding the future.

Apart from translations of such contemporary Jewish writers as Chaim Nachman Bialik, I. J. Singer, Shmarya Levin, and others, Mr. Samuel has produced in the Jewish field many original works including: THE WORLD OF SHOLOM ALEICHEM, a reconstruction and interpretation of the background and great creations of the famous Yiddish writer; PRINCE OF THE GHETTO, a similar treatment of the works of Yitzchak Loeb Peretz; THE GENTLE-MAN AND THE JEW, a study in contrasts of the Jewish and Gentile conceptions of ethics; THE GREAT HA-TRED, an expose of anti-Semitism; and HARVEST IN THE DESERT, an account of the Jewish homeland in the making.

A BUSY WEEK FOR A RABBI

Every week is a busy one for a rabbi, but the one just passed was especially so for Rabbi Lookstein. First of all, as President of the Mizrachi Education Committee, the Rabbi was a delegate to the Mizrachi Convention in Atlantic City over the last weekend. He gave the major address of the closing session of that Convention and spoke on the Bar-Ilan University, the religious university of academic studies being established in Israel under Mizrachi auspices. The Rabbi pointed out the importance of Bar-Ilan for the future of Israel, and we understand that despite the prevailing wind, sleet and snow outside the convention hall, his address was received with warmth and enthusiasm.

The Rabbi then returned to New York in time to address the biennial convention of the American Jewish Congress at which former President Truman received the Stephen Wise Award for Civil Rights. The Rabbi, who was an official delegate to the World Congress in Geneva this summer, joined a panel discussion on the problems of the American Jewish Community.

At the close of this session, the Rabbi went to Pittsburgh to attend the Golden Anniversary meeting of the Religious Education Association of the United States and Canada which was held at the University of Pittsburgh. Here, the Rabbi participated in a triple seminar on the subject of "Strategies for Making Adequate Provision for Religious Education for all our Young." The other members of the seminar were the Very Rev. Dr. Vincent J. Flynn of the College of St. Thomas and the Rev. Dr. Eugene Blake of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Churches in the United States. In his address the Rabbi drew on his wide experience in the field of education in order to evaluate the place of religious education in America and to make constructive suggestions for its future. The Rabbi also appeared the following morning on a television program sponsored by the Association which took the form of a "round table" on religious education.

The week was thus indeed a full one — and a significant one, too, in that it was indicative of the wide range of the Rabbi's activities in the community, both Jewish and general.
