

YEAR BOOK CAMPAIGN IN FULL SWING

The ad campaign for the congregational year of 1953-54 is off to a fine start. Although work just started on this project two weeks ago, the response has been very gratifying. However, we have a long, long way to go to reach our goal.

Up to now, the major part of the work for this Year Book has been done by the dedicated few who year in and year out have shown their sincere interest. What is needed now is a mass effort by all members and friends to pitch in and help get ads.

CHANUKAH MADE MEANINGFUL

There are many signs in the air that Chanukah falls on this coming Tuesday, December 2, and continues for eight days until the following Tuesday.

The first candle is to be lit this Monday evening, after sundown, with one additional candle added each evening until the full complement of eight candles, besides the Shamosh, is reached.

Chanukah is a grand holiday which is fully celebrated in our Synagogue and in our Religious Schools. It is important that it also be celebrated in the home. We would like to point out several ways in which Chanukah can be brought meaningfully into the home: have each child light his own candle in his own Menorah and make the candle lighting a family affair with everyone doing it; serve the special foods associated with Chanukah including, of course, the famous latke; decorate the home with various Chanukah motifs, either professionally made or by the members of the household; have on hand books with Chanukah stories and tell them to the young ones. In short, make Chanukah meaningful by having it experienced in

CHANUKAH PROGRAM STRESSES CREATIVITY
