SIGMUND ROTHSCHILD GUEST AT SISTERHOOD MEETING Famed Appraiser To Conduct "Treasure Hunt"

The Sisterhood Open Meeting of Monday afternoon, January 11th, will feature Mr. Sigmund Rothschild, wellknown appraiser and fine arts restorer, who will discuss antiques and how to buy them. As a special feature, Mr. Rothschild will conduct a "Treasure Hunt" similar to his television show, in which he will appraise articles submitted by members of the Sisterhood.

Well known to professional antique collectors and art dealers throughout the world for his ability to track down the values of obscure antiques and art objects, Mr. Rothschild has been at his interesting and unique craft for many years. His more famous finds include: six letters valued at \$100,000 which were written by Abraham Lincoln's wife to the forbear of an Englewood, N. J. woman; a painting bought by a client for \$105 which he restored as a genuine Titian valued between \$30,-000 and \$100,000.

Here is a remarkable opportunity for members and friends to have articles appraised. During the time alloted, Mr. Rothschild will be able to appraise 50 objects. Since there will be many more requests than this, arrangements must be made prior to the meeting either by calling or by stopping in at the Synagogue office. To defray the expense involved in having Mr. Rothschild present, there will be a charge of \$1.00 for each item appraised.

Mr. Rothschild has emphasized that there need be no hesitancy about bringing in any kind of article. Into his studios come items from everywhere – two ton granite carvings and petrified ants; 1880 penny valentines and early Sears Roebuck catalogues. From
