KASHRUTH HANDBOOK SENT TO CONGREGATION

An attractive, well illustrated handbook on Kashruth is being mailed to all our members with the compliments of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun.

The Handbook is a highly readable and clear-cut presentation of Kashruth designed to answer most of the questions on the subject brought up in daily practice. The introduction deals with the meaning of Kashruth and the importance of the Kosher home in Jewish life. It provides a definition of just what is meant by the term Kosher.

The pamphlet states what animals, birds, poultry and fish fall in the category of being Kosher. With the expert use of many pictures, it explains how meats and poultry are prepared.

Other topics discussed are dishes and utensils, glass dishes and the use of dishwashers. It goes into the area of packaged food products, the selection of resorts, camps and restaurants and the problem of Hechsher, adequate Rabbinical supervision. There is a section on Passover and a full list of Kashruth vocabulary.

The Handbook is published by the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America with which our Congregation is affiliated. It has been acclaimed by Rabbinical authorities and laymen alike.

The Handbook answers the longfelt need for an attractive, concise and highly readable pamphlet on Kashruth. We are sure it will be of interest to our members. If further copies are desired, please contact the Synagogue office.

The Kabalat Shabbat, the Maariv service, the Kiddush, the special benediction by the Rabbi and the warm bidding of "Good Shabbos" to your fellow worshipers all help make this service a rare experience.

The Sabbath, the day of holiness and rest, is ushered out with all the beauty of ritual with which it is welcomed in.

The Mincha prayers are chanted with a melody used at no other service and whose origin goes back many centuries. Between Mincha and Maariv there is a discourse on the portion of
