"WOMEN'S CHANGING ROLE IN AMERICAN SOCIETY" TOPIC FOR MARCH 8th OPEN MEETING

"Women's Changing Role in the Home, on the Job, and in the Community" will be discussed at our next Open Luncheon Meeting on Monday, March 8, 12:30 P.M., in the Social Hall. Mrs. Hyman Abrams, Sisterhood President, announced that a panel of three prominent women will represent housewife, profession and community service points of view. Mr. William Karp, President of Vocational Consulting Associates, who has helped thousands of men and women make more effective use of their abilities, will serve as moderator.

Today, more and more women are called upon to enter employment and community roles. They feel the urge of the times and restlessly search for a more creative existence. What is women's role in modern society? Where should she place her main interest—in the home, in the community, or in employment? Can she find a way to balance all three? What responsibility does she have to her family to maintain the household? What does she owe the community in helping solve educational, welfare, social and political problems? Should she seek to enter the business world to put her talents to use in employment for the benefit of herself and society and at the same time bring herself closer to economic freedom and equality?

Since the turn of the 20th century, the position of women in American society has undergone marked changes. For one thing, they have emerged from confinement to household chores. They climbed the political, social and economic ladder to greater freedom and equality. They achieved legal status with men; earned the right to vote; entered educational institutions

of higher learning broke through the wall of prejudice to assume positions of responsibility in business and in the professions; were elected to high government posts; and won distinction in community welfare activities.

Today the pressures upon women, as upon men, are acute. She has many roles to play. In the home, she is a housewife with responsibilities for running a smooth household, caring for children, and tending to a variety of chores. In the community, she participates in social, political, and welfare activities. On the job, she has opportunities to put to use her talents and abilities in direct competition with men, obtain satisfaction from work, and add to family income.

Two members of the Sisterhood, whose names will be announced next week, will be joined by a guest panelist in the discussion. Our guest, Mrs. Henry Schapper will present the point of view of the woman in professional life. Mrs. Schapper is a well known professional writer, her articles having appeared in Readers' Digest, Coronet, Women's Home Companion and Glamour among others. She was the first writer to track down women who had been interviewed by Dr. Kinsey and get their reactions.

Mr. William Karp, the moderator, is consulted by men and women who seek to utilize their abilities and talents in the work-a-day world. In 20 years of experience in treating vocational difficulties, he has helped more than 100,000 persons of all ages with their job, career, and school problems.

Mrs. Harry W. Baumgarten, as Program Chairman, is responsible for arrangements for this challenging meeting.
