JOSEPH E. ADLER RETIRES AS RITUAL DIRECTOR; ENDS TWENTY YEARS SERVICE TO ENTER BUSINESS

Mr. Joseph E. Adler, who for almost 21 years has served as Ritual Director of our congregation, informed the Board of Trustees of the congregation that he would like to be relieved of his duties because of his desire to enter business. He made this intention known in October and the Board accepted the announcement with deep regret.

A Committee for the Selection of a Ritual Director was appointed shortly thereafter. It consisted of Mr. Harry W. Baumgarten, Chairman, Mr. Oscar Perlberger and Mr. Isidore Schlang. The Committee interviewed a long list of applicants and several of "them officiated as guest Ritual Directors at Sabbath services over the last several months. It is expected that the recommendation of the Committee will be made known soon and the Board of Trustees will appoint a successor to Mr. Adler.

Mr. Adler came to Kehilath Jeshurun during the dark depression days of 1933 from Baltimore, Maryland, where he served as cantor in one of the leading congregations. During the years that he spent with us he played a major part in the development and growth of the congregation. It was not long before our congregation recognized in him a devoted religious functionary and an expert in every department of his profession. Above all, he won a place for himself in the hearts of the membership. He and his wife, Chana, were cherished members of the Kehilath Jeshurun family.

Several years ago the Adlers established a business for the production of canned gefulte fish. We are happy to learn that the business prospered and has grown sufficiently to warrant the full-time attention of Mr. Adler. We hope that it will continue

SHABBAT HAGODOL BRUNCH

Always on the alert to new needs and conditions, our Congregation is making preparations for a rather untried and novel experience. Passover eve this year falls on Saturday, April 17th. That fact imposes problems and hardships that many households cannot cope with. One of these problems is the serving of breakfast that morning in a home that is fully prepared for Passover.

In order, therefore, to cooperate in this matter we are planning to serve brunch in the Social Hall of the synagogue that Saturday. The synagogue service will begin at 7:15 in the morning in order that it may be completed by about 9 o'clock. Following services a catered "Shabbos Brunch" will be served to all who may care to take advantage of this convenience. This will be a regular Sabbath meal prepared by Richelieu Caterers. The fee is \$3.50 per person. Reservations must be made in advance and we must be informed of them no later than by Monday, April 12th.

Please note, no reservation forms nor letters of invitation will be sent to our membership. The only notice about this service is the one appearing in this Bulletin. Those who are interested, therefore, should please inform us immediately. A reservation form for this purpose appears on the last page of this Bulletin. Please fill it out and send it to us at once.

Your cooperation in responding promptly will go a long way toward helping us make the necessary arrangements. Another fine turnout of members and friends filled the Social Hall last Sunday evening to hear Rabbi Lookstein give another brilliant talk, this time on "Resurrection: Where and When Does Life End?" It was the third of the four Sunday Supper Lectures.

The evening began with a fine meal (with a special feature, Southern fried chicken). The large audience was in a warm and friendly mood and receptive to the highlight of the evening, the Rabbi's talk.
