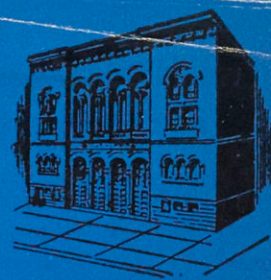

OUR SERVICE DURING THE SUMMER

While all major congregational activities and functions are suspended for the summer months, daily and Sabbath services are held according to a year-round uninterrupted schedule. The attendance at services during the past year has increased consistently — a fact of which we are genuinely gratified and proud.

With the coming of the summer months, however, when so many of our worshippers leave the city for seashore or mountain resorts, the attendance naturally decreases. Sabbath services, of course, still attract a goodly number of congregants. The daily services, on the other hand, present a bit of a problem.

The community which our congregation serves is, unfortunately, not heavily populated with Jewish residents. We cannot, therefore, expect a casual passer-by to drop in for services. We must rely upon our regular worshippers to provide our daily morning and evening minyan.

Daily services are held in the Chapel, where cool comfort accompanies a short but dignified service, at 7:30 in the morning and 6:00 in the evening. On the Sabbath, the services are conducted in the Main Synagogue, where we will continue to provide our worshippers with a decorous and spiritually-uplifting service in pleasant and comfortable surroundings.

We appeal to our readers to help us maintain the fundamental institution of daily services by attending as frequently as possible. If you are in the city and find it possible to join us for a morning or an evening, please make it a point to do so.

Chapel and Social Hall Now Air-Conditioned

Our eagerly anticipated cooling system has been installed and our Chapel and Social Hall are now air-conditioned. This air-conditioning will fulfill a sorely-felt need and will help us to be better able to service our members and friends.

During the warm summer days the cooling system will permit our worshippers to pray in comfort. It will also make our facilities more desirable for weddings, enhancing, as it does, the beautifully decorated Chapel and Social Hall.

The air-conditioning unit has been designed with a look to the future. With its present installation it can be easily extended to cool the Auditorium too when its extension there is desired.

The members of our House Committee put in much time and effort to make this project possible. These members are Mr. Aaron J. Simon, chairman; Mr. Hyman I. Cohen and Mr. Alexander Gross. The unit was designed and supervised by a special consultant. The House Committee made its recommendations to the Board and the Board had approved them.

We would like to express our thanks to the members of the House Committee for their successful efforts. We know that our membership will greatly profit from the cooling system and we can be pleased that our Synagogue is now a more comfortable and beautiful place.
