# NEAR CAPACITY CONGREGATION ATTEND SELICOTH SERVICES Beautiful High Holiday Services Planned

A fine congregation of members and friends filled the Synagogue to near-capacity last Saturday night to usher in the High Holiday season with the traditional Selichoth Service. In spite of a rain that fell all evening the number of worshippers was the largest to attend a Selichoth service in our Synagogue.

Those who attended were amply rewarded. The service was beautiful and moving and a fitting introduction to the High Holiday season. A special delight was our new cantor who officiated for the first time at our Selichoth Service. Cantor Konigsberg thrilled the congregation with his beautiful voice and cantorial melodies.

One hour prior to the Service the Men's Club and Sisterhood acted as hosts at a Midnight Snack where members and friends got together for a social hour.

We are now making arrangements for holiday meals to be served in our Sukkah during the forthcoming Sukkoth festival. Full course catered meals will be served on five occasions: Monday evening, October 11; Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, October 12th and 13th; Friday night, October 15th; and Saturday afternoon, October 16th.

Plans for Sukkah meals were formulated in order to render the observance of Jewish holidays more meaningful and more beautiful. Our large and beautifully decorated Sukkah is on the third floor of the Synagogue House, and will be the scene of joyous festivity appropriate to the spirit of Sukkoth.

The price per plate has been set at a nominal \$6.50. This covers everything that will be required, including gratuities.

# Fifty Reservations Needed -

In order for us to make these arrangements for catered meals, we must have at least fifty reservations. The dead-line for making reservations is Tuesday, October 5th. In order to avoid involved bookkeeping records, all reservations must be accompanied by check.

To assure yourself of an enjoyable Yom Tov in keeping with the traditional practice of having meals in the Sukkah, we suggest you call the Synagogue office now and place your reservations.

# SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES

Many worshippers will be with us for the first time these High Holidays. For their benefit, as well as for the benefit of our regular worshippers, we make known the following ordinances:

- 1. ADMISSION TO THE SERVICES DURING THE HIGH HOLIDAYS WILL BE BY CARD ONLY. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 2. THERE WILL BE NO VACANT SEATS DURING THE HOLIDAYS. We therefore ask our worshippers not to bring children to the Synagogue unless seats have been reserved for them. To do otherwise will crowd and inconvenience those who have a right to their seats.
- 3. Worshippers who find their seats occupied will please call the attention of the ushers to this fact.
- 4. Very young children who are incapable of proper conduct should not be brought to the synagogue.
- 5. The doors will be closed during the sermon. Please be in your seat before the sermon begins.
- 6. Please join in the congregational singing.
- 7. Conversation of any kind is forbidden during the services. Proper decorum is essential for dignified worship.
- 8. Please do not remove the Talith, or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of the services.
- 9. Our worshippers are invited to take advantage of the checking facilities on the main floor, for the checking of hats and coats. White skull caps are available for the use of all male worshippers. They may be obtained at the checking counters.
- 10. Uniform Prayer Books are available to all. At the close of services please leave the Prayer Book on your seat.
- 11. A House of Worship should at all times command the respect of every Jew, particularly during the days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Worshippers' attire should be conservative and subdued in keeping with the sanctity of the House of God and the solemnity of the season.


# WELCOME HOME, MR. PRESIDENT

Kosher Ethrogim are imported from the groves of Israel where so many depend for their livelihood on the sale of these citrus fruits.
