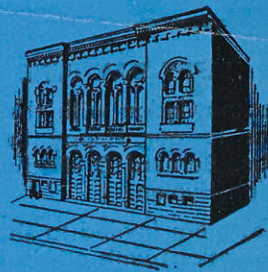

SHABBAT SHEKOLIM: THE FIRST OF FOUR IMPORTANT SABBATHS

This Sabbath is another which takes on added significance. It is known as Shabbat Shekolim and is the first of four important Saturdays that precede the Passover holiday.

In ancient days it was the practice to announce, on the first day of Adar, the collection of a poll tax. This consisted of half a shekel which was used for various public services in the Temple.

The other three significant Sabbaths are known as Shabbat Zachor, immediately preceding Purim; Shabbat Parah; Shabbat Hachodesh. On each of these Sabbaths special prayers are recited and a special portion of the Torah, appropriate to the occasion, is read.

Proven Techniques —

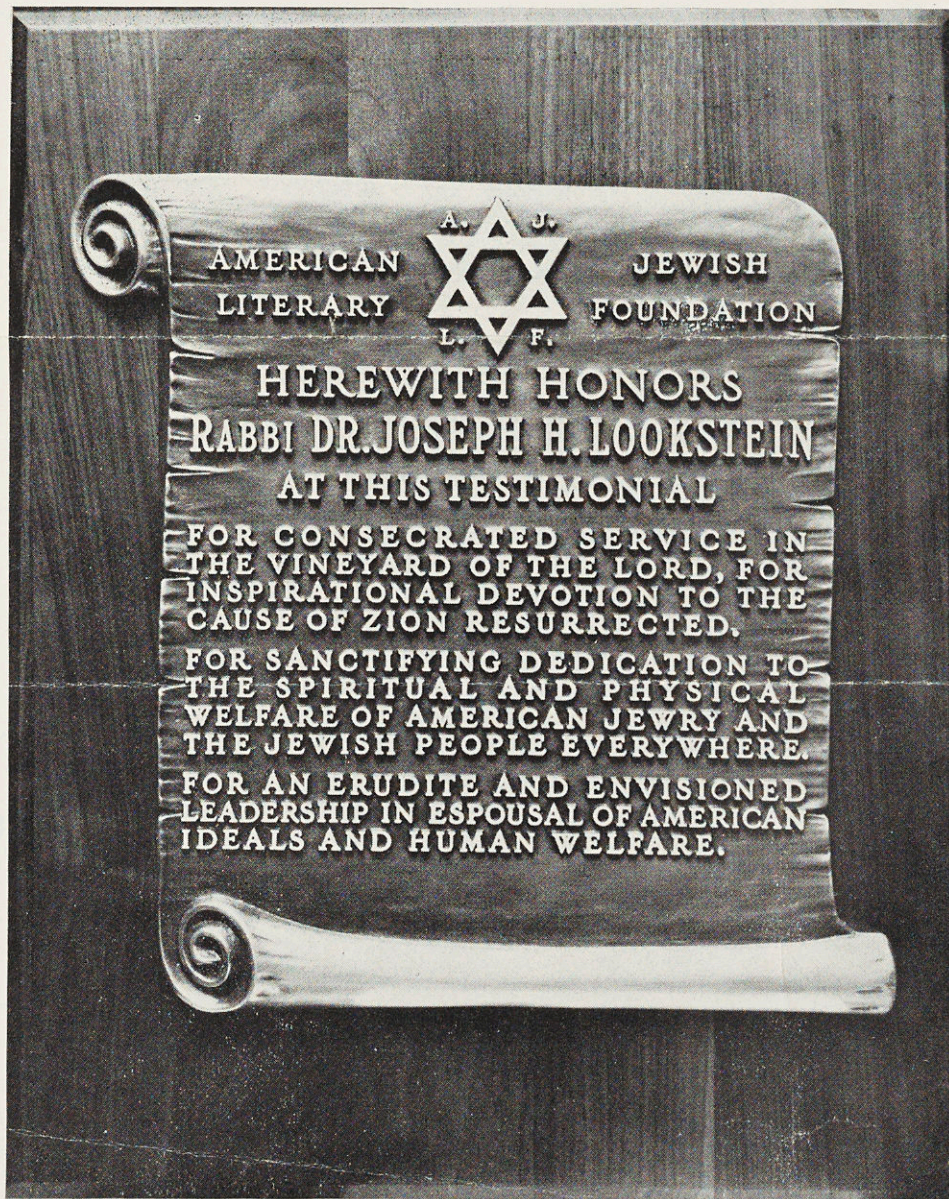
