SABBATH TALMUD CLASS ELICITS FINE RESPONSE

We are very happy with the number of worshipers who attended the first Sabbath Talmud Class which was conducted by Rabbi Sol Roth last Saturday afternoon prior to the Mincha service.

The Talmudic tractate under discussion is Brochos and its subject matter, we feel, can be of interest to many of our worshipers. It deals with the significance, form and content of our Prayers and answers such questions as, what is Prayer; what is the purpose of Prayer and what are the different kinds of Prayers and Religious Services.

Besides the topic of Prayer, the tractate Brochos also concerns itself with such basic concepts as: Good and Evil; Pain and Suffering; Ethics and Morality, and many others. These issues will be discussed as they arise in the study of text.

BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE AGAIN TO BE PUBLISHED FOR SHEVUOTH HOLIDAY

The 1955 Book of Remembrance is now in the process of being prepared for publication so that it will be ready for our worshipers for the Shevuoth Festival. The Book of Remembrance, since its origin several years ago, has become an institution in Kehilath Jeshurun. It is used on the four occasions of the year when the Yizkor service is conducted, containing as it does an appropriate memorial prayer together with the names of the departed ones to be memorialized.

Here is an excellent opportunity to participate in an unusually rewarding discussion. We extend a cordial invitation to all our members and friends to join the Saturday afternoon Talmud Class which is held one hour preceding the Mincha service. This Saturday the class will begin at 6:40 p.m.

Members of our congregational family are well aware of the important role which the Book of Remembrance plays, and the use to which it is put during the year. There is, however, one point worth re-emphasizing — particularly for the benefit of those who are not familiar with the nature of this publication, namely, that this is by no means a fund-raising project. It is free of every aspect of commercialism, and consistent with the Yizkor prayer in which a pronouncement of a pledge for charity is made. In order that such a pledge may be properly fulfilled, we give our congregants an opportunity to make a Yizkor offering every year before the Shevuoth holiday, when the Book of Remembrance appears. The names of the departed, in whose memory the offering is made, are included in the Book which is placed in the hands of our worshipers at the Memorial Ser-

In order to stress the purely religious character of the offering, it has been limited to no less than five dollars and no more than ten dollars for each name to be memorialized. Thus, the offering is purged of any material tinge, and represents purely a token of reverence for the departed.

Our readers have already received correspondence from the Synagogue Office with regard to the 1955 Book of Remembrance. Among the literature they received was an Authorization Card which was to be returned to the Office, giving the names of those to be included in the Book. The task of preparing the little volume is an exacting and time consuming one; it requires painstaking effort to check and re-check the many names that are submitted. We ask, therefore, that those who wish to have names inserted in this year's Book of Remembrance, submit them to the Office, without delay, on the Authorization Card they received



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

Jewish Education Committee Survey Selects our Afternoon School -

The Jewish Education Committee has at present undertaken a survey to compare the learning results of those children who attend a three day a week Religious School with those who attend the one day a week Sunday School. We are happy to announce that our Afternoon Religious School has been selected by the J. E. C. as the school representing the three day a week program.

"This is indeed something that our teaching staff, our students, in fact, our whole Kehilath Jeshurun family can be proud of," said Theodore Comet, Principal. During the course of the survey, the classrooms will be visited and the students will be tested.

This past Sunday was the last one on which regular sessions of our Religious School will be held this semester. The classes ordinarily held on Sundays will be conducted on Friday afternoons from 4 to 6 P.M. Sessions on Friday will begin May 6th. The children of our Primary class who ordinarily meet on Sunday morning alone, will also change their class time to Friday afternoon.

Children Enjoy Hebrow Movie Program -

We tried out something new last Sunday morning which worked out very successfully. In order to give our students the realization that Hebrew is a living tongue that is not confined to the classroom and Synagogue alone, we arranged, together with other Synagogues in the neighborhood, for a special program which was held in the Thalia Theatre. Two films were selected that would be of interest to our young people and whose appeal was mainly visual. These films were dubbed in with Hebrew sound tracks. In addition, a magician performed tricks with Hebrew commentary. The program met with a very favorable response from our children. It was an excellent learning experience and one that they enjoyed thoroughly.

Jewish Museum Visited -

Last week, our children went to the Jewish Museum to see the special exhibit, 'A Carnival of Three Centuries". This exhibit provided "A Peep into the Next Three Hundred Years" and included art objects made by children of various Religious Schools. One of the finest murals in the exhibit was the one that was made by our own students.
