RABBI LEO JUNG TO LECTURE ON "ETHICS AND THE ATOM" JANUARY 4th

Our Adult Education Committee has announced that Rabbi Leo Jung, prominent rabbi, scholar and Orthodox leader, will deliver the next lecture in the Adult Institute series on Wednesday evening, January 4th. The topic under discussion at that time will be "Ethics and the Atomic Age."

Rabbi Jung is the spiritual leader of our neighboring congregation across the park, the Jewish Center, and is well known to our membership. He combines the tradition and education of the great schools of learning, the Yeshivoth of Hungary and Germany with the secular training of the Universities of Vienna, Berlin, London and Cambridge.

Since 1931 Rabbi Jung has been professor of ethics at Yeshiva University and since 1950 he has been president of the Jewish Academy of Arts and Sciences. Some of his other activities include chairmanship of the Cultural Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee, membership on the Council of the Jewish Agency for Palestine and Chairman of the New York State Government Advisory Board for the Enforcement of the Kashruth Law.

Dr. Jung is the editor of "The Jewish Library", five series of which have already been published, and have been widely acclaimed. He is the author of many books and pamphlets, among them "Foundations of Judaism", "Living Judaism", "Crumbs and Character", "Jewish Foundations of the New

World Order" and "Modern Trends in American Judaism."

In a world that is torn both physically and spiritually some moral order, some sense of balance is necessary. Rabbi Jung will deal with this problem in his talk. He brings to his platform many years of experience and it should prove a most rewarding discussion.

This talk is the fourth in the series "Modern Thought and the Jewish Spirit." The first three lectures devoted to this theme were concerned with the areas of Psychology and Jewish Thougt. The concluding two will be on "Creation and Evolution", featuring Rabbi Moses Tendler on January 11th, and "Some Modern Jewish Philosophers" featuring Prof. Sidney Hook on January 18th.

NOTES ON THE WEEKLY PORTION

Sir Walter Scott wrote of Judah's appeal to Joseph, described in Verses 18 to 34 of Chapter XLIV, "The most complete pattern of genuine natural eloquence extant in any language". This passage is a classical one not only because of the style in which it is written but more fundamentally because of the idea which it so forcefully suggests. It is a passage well worth studying.

Chapter XLVI describes the journey taken by Jacob's family from the Land of Promise to Egypt. This was a historic trip, but for Jacob it was a very disturbing trip. It is this disturbance that gives special significance to verses 2 to 4 of this chapter. See also Dr. Hertz on Verse 3.

Joseph's father and brothers were shepherds and "every shepherd is an abomination to the Egyptians" (verse 34, Chapter XLIV). But Joseph's family was coming to Egypt, and he would have to present them to the Pharoah. For Joseph's treatment of his "poor relations", see Verses 31 to 34 of Chapter 46, and Dr. Hertz' introduction to Chapter XLVII.
