SUNDAY SUPPER LECTURE SERIES CONCLUDED WITH OUTSTANDING TALK BY RABBI LOOKSTEIN

Much to the regret of those who attended this year's Sunday Supper lectures, the series was brought to a conclusion this past Sunday evening. This regret was not for the end of the Sunday suppers but for the end of Rabbi Lookstein's erudite Sunday discourses which would not be heard again till next year.

Again, as with the previous lecture, the weather man was most uncooperative. The weather outside was certainly not dry. For that matter, neither was the Rabbi's talk. The large and enthusiastic audience was delighted with his stimulating and exciting lecture and felt well rewarded for venturing out in the inclement weather.

Continuing with the theme of "Man in Search of God," Rabbi Lookstein devoted this final lecture to the subject of Neo-Hasidism, with particular attention to the theories and beliefs of Abraham J. Heschel.

"Neo-Hasidism," the Rabbi pointed out, "is as much a response to the needs of the twentieth century Jew as Hasidism was to the Jew of the eighteenth century." Hasidism was born during a time of stress and strain for the East European Jew. It was a reaction to the ruthless conditions of existence in countries like Poland, Lithuania and Russia during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. Neo-Hasidism, likewise, was a reaction to the external conditions of the twentieth century, when history practically repeated itself.

Relating this talk to the two previous ones, Rabbi Lookstein stated that "the Hasidic rabbi was an existentialist with a **shtreimel**" and that Martin Buber, as a Jewish existentialist, naturally drew upon Hasidic thought. Although Neo-Hasidism is the "only genuinely Jewish variety of existentialism . . . it is not mere dialectics nor the result of what Professor Heschel calls 'situational thinking.' Its object is not simply to understand the world but to teach man how to live in it."

There are, according to Heschel, three trails that lead to God: sensing God's presence in the world; recognizing God's presence in the Bible; and feeling God's presence through the performance of sacred deeds. Discussing the last of these trails, the Rabbi noted that "man must learn the 'science of deeds,' for it is through such deeds that he establishes a link with God. Heschel calls this form of relationship to God as 'the leap of action.' . . . There is no Judaism without the performance of Mitzvoth."

The foregoing is only a brief summary of some of the highlights of Rabbi Lookstein's lecture. To do full justice to his learned presentation of the subject of Neo-Hasidism is beyond the limitation of space in this Bulletin. Following the talk there was a spirited question and answer period which brought the series to a close in a blaze of enthusiasm and audience participation.

Last year the report of the lectures stated that "our Annual Supper Lecture Series was brought to a close last Sunday by Rabbi Lookstein with an address that marked a new highpoint for supper lectures." These words apply equally well this year. Each succeeding series obviously is destined to outshine its predecessors, which augurs well for next year's program.

HARRY G. SCHWARTZ TO SPEAK ON "SOVIET RUSSIA TODAY" AT MEN'S CLUB ANNUAL MEETING MAY 2nd

Our Men's Club has been fortunate in getting as its special guest for its Annual Meeting the renowned expert on Russian life, Harry G. Schwartz. At that meeting Dr. Schwartz will speak on the topic "Soviet Russia Today."

For the past eight years Dr. Schwartz has been the New York Times Specialist on Soviet Affairs. He is the author of numerous books and articles on Russia and, although only 37 years old, is recognized as one of the best informed men on this subject in our country.

Born and raised in New York City, Dr. Schwartz, on a Pulitzer Scholarship, attended Columbia University where he received his PH.D. During the war years he served in the War Production Board, the Department of Agriculture, the Office of Strategic Services, and the State Department. In this latter post he was for two years a specialist on Soviet Economic Intelligence.

An expert who is not only well informed but also articulate, Dr. Schwartz has taught at Columbia University, Brooklyn College and Syracuse University.

It is indeed a pleasure for us to have Dr. Schwartz at our Annual Meeting, and we look forward to an informative and incisive report from him.

This meeting will also feature other items of interest to our members, including the election of officers and members of the Executive Board for the coming year. For an unusual evening our members and friends are urged to attend our Annual Meeting.
