SAMUEL VIGODA APPOINTED CANTOR FOR HIGH HOLY DAYS Will Begin Officiating at Selichoth Services

Max J. Etra, president of the congregation, announced that Samuel Vigoda has been engaged as cantor for the coming High Holy Day and Succoth period. He will officiate at his first service this Saturday at Selichoth Midnight Services. We extend a cordial invitation to all our members and friends to join us at that time in a warm welcome to him.

We are fortunate to be able to have with us Cantor Vigoda, who is one of the outstanding cantors of our times. Often called "the most traveled cantor" he has officiated at services and appeared at concerts in most of the large cities throughout the world.

Born and educated in Europe, Cantor Vigoda combines Jewish and musical scholarship. He achieved cantorial prominence at an early age and consequently was called to the United States to succeed the famous Cantor Joseph Rosenblatt. Cantor Vigoda's unique interpretation of synagogue music has been brought to a wide audience through his many RCA Victor Recordings.

The cantor is no newcomer to Kehilath Jesurun, his son having been graduated this past June from Ramaz School.

Sessions in the afternoon Religious School for the coming year will be resumed on Monday and Tuesday, September 10th and 11th, it was announced by Theodore Comet, Principal.

Those classes that meet on Monday, Wednesday and Sunday will begin on September 10th, while the Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday groups will resume on Tuesday, September 11th. Students are being notified as to which days they will attend.

Registration is now in progress and will continue for a limited time. This is to insure that classroom study will start on a firm basis for all children with a minimum of lost time.

The primary class for six and seven year olds that was inaugurated two years ago will continue to meet on Sunday mornings.

We take pride in the steady progress that our school makes from year to year. Again last year we were cited by the Jewish Education Committee. While there has been a fine increase in the number of students entering our school, pupil enrollment is limited in order for us to maintain a personal relationship between teacher and student and between the school and the home. Classes are small in size, and each pupil has the benefit of personal attention on the part of his teacher. Those who attended the Parents Day Sabbath last June were able to get some idea of the excellence of our school.

Aside from the formal classes, learning takes place through Arts and Crafts, Music, Dramatics and trips to institutions of Jewish interest. The afternoon Religious School makes learning fun.

MIDNIGHT SELICHOTH SERVICES TO BE HELD THIS SATURDAY

The High Holiday season will be ushered in Saturday night, September 1st, at 12:30 a.m., when the traditional Selichoth Service will be held in the Synagogue.

Preceding the services, a "Midnight Snack" is being arranged by the Sisterhood and Men's Club, to which all the members of these groups, as well as the entire membership of the Congregation, are invited. The get-together is being planned in order to give our congregational family an opportunity to meet in an informal, social atmosphere for the first time this year. While partaking of a delightful snack, our members will have a chance to renew old acquaintances and to greet each other after a lapse of several months. This "social hour" has been called for 11:30.

The last few years have brought ever-increasing numbers to the midnight Selicoth services. Ladies have enjoyed attending this service, where they are seated in a special section of the Synagogue that has been reserved for them. In fact, entire families have joined in worship at our services which are made more intelligible and meaningful with every successive year.

The service lasts a little over an hour. Prayer books, with English translations, are made available to all. The prayers are made clear and understandable through Rabbi Lookstein's explanations. Congregational melodies and responsive readings will form part of the service. Young as well as old will be inspired by the manner in which the service is conducted.

A special treat in store for us this year is the chance to hear our outstanding new cantor, Samuel Vigoda, officiate for the first time at our Selichoth service.

Our warmest invitation is extended to our worshippers to attend the Selichoth Service once again this year, to usher in the High Holiday season in the proper religious spirit.

SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES

**Selichot Services will be held during the week between Rosh Hashanah

and Yom Kippur one half-hour before the regular morning services.

Many worshippers will be with us for the first time these High Holidays. For their benefit, as well as for the benefit of our regular worshippers, we make known the following ordinances.

- 1. ADMISSION TO THE SERVICES DURING THE HIGH HOLIDAYS WILL BE BY CARD ONLY. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 2. THERE WILL BE NO VACANT SEATS DURING THE HOLIDAYS. We therefore ask our worshippers not to bring children to the Synagogue unless seats have been reserved for them. To do otherwise will crowd and inconvenience those who a right to their seats.
- 3. Have your youngsters attend Children's Services provided for them in the Chapel. Services will be held on Rosh Hashanah, and Yom Kippur from 11 to 1 o'clock.
- 4. Worshippers who find their seats occupied should please call this to the attention of the ushers.
- 5. The doors will be closed during the sermon. Please be in your seat before the sermon begins.

- 6. Please join in the congregational singing.
- 7. Conversation of any kind is forbidden during the services. Proper decorum is essential for dignified worship.
- 8. Please do not remove the Talith, or leave your seat until after the benediction is pronounced at the close of the services.
- 9. Our worshippers are requested to take advantage of the checking facilities on the main floor for the checking of hats and coats. White skull caps are available for the use of male worshippers. They may be obtained at the checking counters.
- 10. Uniform Prayer Books are available to all. At the close of services please leave the Prayer Book on your seat.
- 11. A House of Worship should at all times command the respect of every Jew, particularly during the days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Worshippers' attire should be conservative and subdued in keeping with the sanctity of the House of God and the solemnity of the season.
