# 1956 YEAR BOOK HIGHLY ACCLAIMED

Another year, another Year Book, another feather in our cap. That briefly has been the tale for many years now — ever since the Congregation instituted the publication of its Annual Year Book.

The 1956 volume not only continues the excellent tradition established in the past but has added new lustre to the already growing reputation of the Year Book. It was again printed in two colors and the reaction to it was unanimously favorable.

# Yom Kippur Sermon -

The major innovation this year was the inclusion of the sermon Rabbi Lookstein had delivered on Yom Kippur eve, 1955. Entitled "The Art of Self-Discovery" this sermon contributed an important religious quality to the Year Book. Many comments were made as to its inspirational and intellectual excellence.

# Pictorial Album -

As in the past, the visual highlight of the Year Book is the Pictorial Album—that section which deals pictorially with some topic of Jewish interest. This year we selected a topic that, to our knowledge, has never before been treated in a published volume—"The Sacrifice of Isaac in Jewish Art." The "Akedah" scene has made a more profound impact on Jewish art than any other Biblical theme and we were able to reproduce photographs of many lovely and beautiful works in a splendid color layout. This section is certainly a collector's item.

Synagogue Year in Review -

Of interest to all groups, as well as to the historian of the future, is the illuminating article written by Rabbi Lookstein "The Synagogue Year in Review", which summarizes all that transpired in Kehilath Jeshurun in the 1955-56 Season. Events ranging from our religious services and our educational and youth activities, to a roster of the Bar Mitzvahs and marriages that took place in our Synagogue, are all recorded in this informative article.

Our members were again pleased with the recording of the Yahrzeit dates for the coming year in the section devoted to the Jewish Calendar. This calendar is illustrated with the Zodiac signs from the Beth Alpha Mosiac. The calendar pages continue until Rosh Hashanah of 1957.

Activity Reports -

Those who read the volume carefully will learn a great deal about Kehilath Jeshurun from the articles and reports by the president of the Congregation and the heads of our Men's Club, Sisterhood, Religious School and the Ramaz School.

In all the 1956 Year Book is another link in the long chain of Synagogue projects of which we may well be proud. From the literary and artistic standpoints it is a fine achievement. No other Synagogue in the county, to our knowledge has such an annual publication.

Our Executive Director, Theodore Comet, was again the editor and Selma Frischling was assistant editor.

Our guest speaker has, for the past four years, held the position as Consul at the Consulate General of Israel in New York. Prior to that she served in the Israel Embassy in our nation's capital and was acting head of the United States Division of the Ministry for foreign affairs.

Born in Germany, Miss Herlitz came to Israel as a child. She was graduated from the Jerusalem Hebrew Teachers College and served as a Lieutenant in the British Army during World War II. During the Israel War of Independance she was second in command of the "Chen" (Women's Battalion in Jerusalem. In between she sandwiched in an appointment as secretary of the Division for Arab Affairs of the Jewish Agency's Political Department.
