Rabbi Lookstein was requested by the Board of Trustees of the Bar Ilan University, the only university under religious sponsorship in Israel, to survey the needs of the institution following the untimely passing of Dr. Pinkhos Churgin, president of the University.

The University was established three years ago and is organized after the pattern of American institutions of higher learning.

The Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein will remain in Israel for about one month.

One of the guest preachers will be Rabbi Leon Stitskin, of the Community Service Division of Yeshiva University. The date of his appearance, as well as of the appearance of others, will be announced in forthcoming issues of the Bulletin.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY DISCUSSED AT SISTERHOOD LUNCHEON MEETING

A symposium on "Juvenile Delinquency in our Neighborhood" was heard at the Sisterhood Open Lunch-meeting this past Monday. Mrs. Oscar Perlberger, Sisterhood President, introduced Mr. Theodore Comet, director of the Youth Department of the American Zionist Council who chaired the meeting.

Juvenile Delinquency, which in recent years has become a problem of national proportions, was brought down to a local level by two people who are involved actively in dealing with actual and potential delinquents and gangs. Patrolman John Naeder, director of Youth Activities of the 19th Precinct, which covers our general neighborhood, discussed the activities of the Police Department in preventing the development of delinquent gangs as well as in apprehending those young people who have run afoul of the law. The task of his department is to keep in close contact with the activities and whereabouts of those potential dangerous groups.

Bernard Clyne is a project worker for Interfaith Neighbors, a social work agency sponsored by several religious groups in mid-Manhattan. The focus of Mr. Clyne's attention is not primarily law enforcement but rather is the use of the techniques of the social worker to guide these young people into socially useful activities.

In addition to the talks of the panelists a motion picture "Boy with a Knife" was shown. A discussion actively participated in by the membership followed the program.
