ADULT INSTITUTE OPENS SUMMER SESSION

One of the cardinal principles of Traditional Judaism teaches that the pursuit of knowledge is not an activity to be relegated to one portion of the year. We are, rather, required to study morning and evening, summer and winter, throughout our lives.

In accordance with this precept, the Kehilath Jeshurun Adult Institute is inaugurating its summer session beginning this work.

The first course is the regular study of the Mishna, conducted at the close of every morning service during the week.

The second course, in the Ethics of the Fathers, will be conducted every Sabbath afternoon, one hour before Mincha services. The text will be explained and analyzed with particular reference made to the commentary of Maimonides. The only prerequisite for this course is a desire to learn and discuss this basic work. Men and women, young and old are invited.

The third course, in Talmud, will be conducted every Wednesday night at 8:00 P.M. The subject material will be the sixth chapter of the Tractate "Berachot" which deals with the various and diverse blessings made over food. An attempt will be made to explain the origin of each blessing, its function, and its applicability in one's life. Men and women, possessed of a desire to study Talmud and understand the function of these blessings, are cordially invited to attend.
