The Sabbath Seudah Seminar which, for the past five years, has warmed the hearts of as many as seventy five participants on a cold wintery Saturday afternoon, will be inaugurated this Sabbath at 4:30 P.M. with a number of new and youthful features.

Religion, Refreshments and Reflection

The program begins with Mincha in the chapel. The Torah will be read by young Myron Miller while the cantor for the service will be our new member Mr. Gerald Kaufman. The officiating of "non professionals" will be a regular feature of this program.

We will then adjourn to the Social Hall where a light and warm collation will be served. The Sabbath mood will be captured by appropriate Z'mirot, and new congregational melodies will be taught by Cantor Plitnick.

The highlight of the Seminar will be a discussion of some aspect of the weekly portion, led by a member of the group.

The Role of Parents

This week two of our younger members will jointly act as discussants. Dr. and Mrs. Fred Zuckerman will analyze the problem of the friction between parents, which may arise out of their roles as guardians of their children's development. For the background of this discussion, please consult Genesis, Chapter 21 (verses 9-15 especially). Following their analysis the floor will be opened to questions and comments on the topic itself in particular and upon the portion of the week in general. The program will conclude with Ma'ariv and a special Havdallah service in the chapel.

This combination of religion, refreshment and reflection is one which you surely will not want to miss. Men, women and children are invited. Why not make it a family affair? Start attending the Seminar Program this week on Saturday Afternoon at 4:30.

FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION
