Two of our very devoted members started, as it were, with the crack of the gun, and have already sent in over fifteen hundred dollars in ads and compliments.

One of last year's champions, Mr. Al Feiner, already obtained over one thousand dollars in ads and greetings from friends and well-wishers. Mr. Richard Kolb, a faithful stand-by at all times, has already gone over the five hundred dollar mark. We are grateful to these two stalwarts and for the example they have set for others.

High Philanthropy -

The Kehilath Jeshurun Year Book has for years been a substantial source of income. Annually, some twenty thousand dollars are realized through it. All the proceeds go entirely to the Educational Scholarship Fund at the Congregation. They are used to provide scholarships at Ramaz School and at the Park East Religious School. In addition, the funds are used to send deserving children to summer camps, and promising students to private colleges of their choice. Not one penny of the proceeds is used for congregational purposes. The Year Book is, indeed, an activity purely philanthropic in the highest sense of that word.

In addition, the Year Book is a work of art and information. It is sent to the libraries of the leading colleges and universities, and it is part of the Library of Congress. It contains a documentary record of all that transpires in Kehilath Jeshurun in the course of the year. As such, it serves as a model for other congregations, and in that way material is provided for the historian of the Jewish community of the future. (Continued on Page 2)

BACKGROUNDS OF CONTEMPORARY JUDAISM TO BE DISCUSSED

AT SECOND OPEN LECTURE

The second lecture of the Kehilath Jeshurun Adult Institute's Open Lecture Series will be delivered by Dr. Sidney B. Hoenig in the Synagogue Social Hall this Wednesday, December 3, at 9:00 P. M.

As part of the general topic, "A Historical Portrait of the Jew", this lecture will cover the period of the Second Jewish Commonwealth and the rise of Babylonia as the center of Jewry (586 B.C.E.-500 C.E.). During this period a profound change occurred in Jewish life, a transformation which gave our religion much of its present day chacter. The process of development during these crucial years led to the redaction of the talmud the source book of contemporary Judaism.

Dr. Sidney B. Hoenig is eminently qualified to discuss this period in breadth. An outstanding Jewish educator, a prolific author, and a fascinating speaker, he is a Professor of Jewish History at Yeshiva University whose special field of interest is the Second Jewish Commonwealth.

We know you will not want to miss this unusual opportunity to gain a clear picture of the events which, more than any others, served to shape the observance of Judaism as we know it today. All of our readers are invited to attend with their families and friends. The lecture will begin promptly at 9:00 P. M. The regular classes of the Institute will of course be held at their usual time 8:00 P. M.
