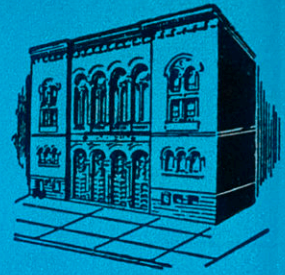

DR. SALO W. BARON TO DISCUSS "WHO IS A JEW" AT THANKSGIVING SERVICE

Once again Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun is conducting its annual Thanksgiving Day Service. This year it will be held on Thursday morning, November 24th, at 11 o'clock.

From year to year, parents and children, young and old, have been coming to this service in ever increasing numbers. The service, composed a score of years ago by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, is of matchless beauty and inspiration.

This year, we will be privileged to hear an address by Prof. Salo W. Baron, a man who is recognized as one of the foremost students of Jewish history in our time.

Dr. Baron is Professor of Jewish History, Literature and Institutions at the Graduate School of Columbia University. He is the author of numerous monographs on Jewish history, among which is the monumental "A Social and Religious History of the Jews," in three volumes.

Professor Baron is no stranger to this congregation. He has lectured several times before our membership and his lectures always bring to the listener a depth of insight and a breadth of understanding which one comes to expect from so accomplished an historian and thinker. His treatment of the problem "Who is a Jew" should no doubt shed important light on a subject which has often been mistreated.

Cantor Cohen and Choir to Officiate

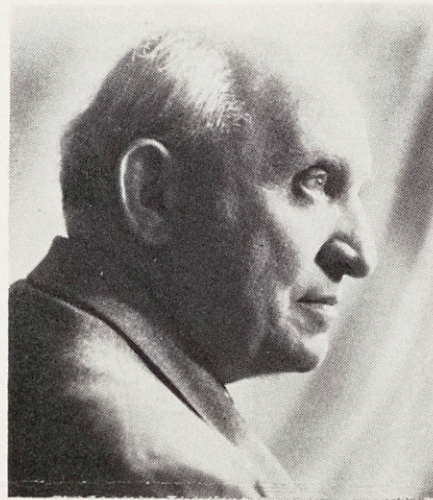
Our newly elected Cantor, A. Joseph Cohen, will officiate at the service accompanied by the Oscar Julius Choir.

"WHY?"

Why is striking a match prohibited on the Sabbath? What work is involved in writing which makes it a Sabbath violation? Why does Jewish law distinguish between carrying an object on the Sabbath in a public thoroughfare on the one hand and in one's home on the other?

Most people wonder about these questions at some time. When they ask them of a rabbi he frequently does not have the opportunity to give them a complete answer. The Sabbath Afternoon Class in the Commandments of Judaism will be devoted to answering these and other questions in its regular session this Saturday afternoon at 3:45.

The Class will be discussing the Commandment "Thou shalt do no manner of work on the Sabbath Day." Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will endeavor to explain what constitutes "work" on the Sabbath according to the Torah.

HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST

Ben Gurion Wires President Elect

Prime Minister David Ben Gurion cabled John F. Kennedy on behalf of the Israeli government to extend "The warmest congratulations on your election to the highest position your country has to offer." He cited the goal of the President Elect as being: Unity among all free nations and devoted fraternal aid to all peoples who need speedy and effective assistance, in order to close the gap between the satisfied and the hungry, between the advanced and the underprivileged.

"From the bottom of my heart," concluded the Prime Minister, "I wish you success in fulfilling the goal with all your talent, energy, and courage; fortified by good will, generosity, and the pioneering spirit of your great people."

UJA Goal for 1961 — \$72,000,000

Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Executive Vice-Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal told the 29th General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds that the UJA has set as its goal in America for 1961, the sum of \$72,000,000. He emphasized that this sum represents an irreducible minimum necessary to carry on the life-saving and life-building work in Israel and throughout the world.

Israel Trains Ghanaian Pilots

The President of Ghana, Dr. Kwame Nkrumah expressed gratitude to the Government of Israel and to the Israel Air Force for the flying school that has been created in Ghana. The occasion marked the graduation, from the Israeli staffed school, of the first ten Ghanaian cadets.

Cuba's Jewish Emigration

Jewish communal leaders of Miami report an enlarged emigration of Jews from Cuba in recent months. There exists a feeling that a new Jewish refugee problem may be in the making. The leaders point out, however, that no official anti-semitism or governmental actions have affected adversely the Jews on the island.

FATHER AND SON MINYAN SPECIAL SERVICE THIS SUNDAY

The Father and Son Minyan has completed the first fifth of its season and is already enjoying the most successful season in its thirteen year tenure. This week the Minyan will hold its fifth service and will commemorate the beginning of the new month of Kislev which falls on Sunday.

In its first four Sundays to date, 86 boys have attended at least once; most of them have been at each service. The attendance has ranged from 46 to 4. Fourteen young men have had an opportunity to serve as cantor; one of them has already served twice.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein, the director of the Minyan, has begun a series of discussions on the structure and the contents of the daily morning service. Charles Kleinhaus, the assistant director of the Minyan, has reported that substantial progress in the realm of basketball has already been evident in the first sessions of the gym period. The empty platters of rolls, eggs and lox speak eloquently of the progress which is being made in the culinary portion of the Minyan program.

We cordially invite all young men of the congregation — young in body and young in soul — to participate in this activity. The minyan presents a wonderful opportunity for a splendid religious, nutritious and invigorating program on Sunday morning. Come down this Sunday at 9:30.

THE WEEKLY PORTION

Genesis 25:19 - 28:9

This portion describes the life of Isaac. Besides an account of Isaac's disputes with the Philistines, the portion deals primarily with the patriarch's progeny, Jacob and Esau. This is perhaps as it should be; for Isaac is best remembered as the vital link which transmitted the tradition of Abraham, the Father of the Jewish People, to Jacob, the man destined to create that People.

From the beginning, Jacob and Esau display the clash of two contrasting personalities; the one hard, strong, athletic and materialistic; the other soft, weak, scholarly, and of a spiritual bend.

The portion is the story of that clash and its effect upon the two protagonists and their parents. As one watches the denouement of the plot, he cannot fail to see the handiwork of Divine Providence as the blessing of Isaac and the tradition of Abraham are bestowed upon Jacob, the younger brother, but the one who is charged with shaping the destiny of Israel.
