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RABBI NORMAN B. FRIMER ADDRESSES ADULT INSTITUTE Comments on Philosophy of Rabbi Yehudah HaLevi

On Wednesday evening, January 4, Rabbi Norman B. Frimer delivered the 3rd lecture in a four part series on the general topic, "Problems and Personalities in Jewish Philosophy." Rabbi Frimer concerned himself with the philosophy of Rabbi Yehudah HaLevi under the general heading, "Can We Talk to God?".

Thus far, in this series, sponsored by the Adult Institute of the congregation, we have heard Rabbi Isaac L. Swift discuss the philosophy of Saadia Gaon, Rabbi Sol Roth analyse the ethical philosophy of Maimonides, and now Rabbi Frimer, on Yehuda Halevi. The final lecture in the series, will be presented on Wednesday evening, February 1, at 9 o'clock. At that time we will hear Rabbi Abraham Besdin speak about the contributions of Rabbi Samon Raphael Hirsch under the general topic "The Challange of Modernism".

We now present some of the salient features in Rabbi Frimer's discussion. Rabbi Yehudah Halevi is best understood in contrast with Maimonides. Concerning Maimonides we know accurately the day, the place, and the year of his birth. We can follow his life from birth to death. We see in him a well-structured personality, and an organized philosophic system of thought.

Concerning Rabbi Yehudah HaLevi, while we know that he was born in the last quarter of the eleventh century, we do not know for sure when, and we are not certain where, although we do know that it was some place in Spain. There is not even a definite proof of when and where he died, although tradition has it that he was killed by an Arab horseman in Jerusalem while he was praying.

Rabbi Yehudah HaLevi, who spent much of his life in Spain, was a stranger in exile. He wrote of himself: "My heart is in the east (Israel) while I reside in the west". He wrote his major philosophic work — the Kuzari — in order to defend Judaism against Arabic and Christian thought — and the Karaitic reform movement.

His philosophic writing contrasts sharply with that of Maimonides. While that great rationalist wrote his philosophy for the super-intellectual and used different logic and technical concepts which would phase the average reader, Rabbi Yehudah HaLevi, who was as much a poet as he was a philosopher, wrote his book for the common man and structured it in a dialogue form in order to give it life, vividness and interest.

The philosopher-poet distinguishes between the God of the philosopher and the God of Abraham. The former is an abstraction, says he. It is detached from man and viewed impersonally, as a first cause. With this God of the infinite, there can be no relationship for man because a relationship cannot exist between the infinite and the finite.

The God of Abraham, says Rabbi

Yehudah HaLevi is a personal God, a God who can be found not through logic but through experience. The collective experience of the Jewish People is a witness to such a God and the individual experience of the Jewish soul bears eloquent testimony to His existence. He approaches the Prophet and can be approached by a man in prayer. He is reached by man through the performance of His Commandments out of a response to the Divine will.

Such a God, says Rabbi Yehudah HaLevi cannot be grasped by speculation alone. He must be sensed by intuition and seen through prophetic vision. Above all, He is a God with whom finite man can have and must have a relationship. The God of Abraham, unlike the God of the philosophers is not a force to be comprehended by man but rather a Divine personality to be apprehended by every human being.

Blythedale is a children's orthopedic hospital and rehabilitation center located within commuting distance from New York City in Valhalla, New York. The institution is designed to care for orthopedically handicapped children and to enabel them to return to their homes and a normal life when maximum rehabilitation has been accomplished. Patients are referred to Blytheby hospitals, social work agencies, and private physicians.

The complete medical care at the hospital is provided by a staff of attending physicians and special consultants in the field of orthopedics, pediatrics, psychiatry psychology, dentistry, radiology and neurology. Active departments and services in social work, physical and occupational therapy, group work, recreation, and speech therapy support and complement the medical services.

Class room instruction, under the auspicies of the New York City Board of Education is provided to all school age children, including those confined to bed.

Blythedale is one of the 116 institutions supported by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York.

Nasser's Military Strength Growing

According to a report made by Shimon Peres, Israel's Deputy Defense Minister, at a meeting of the Political Committee of the 25th World Zionist Congress, President Nasser of the United Arab Republic has more tanks today than Marshall Montgomery had in his desert victory over the Nazi Field Marshall Rommel in the Second War.

Nasser's Political Influence Growing

A resolution declaring that Israel is "an instrument of imperialism and colonialism, not only in the Middle East, but also in Africa", was adopted at a recent summit meeting of five African states. The resolution was pushed through by Nasser as a slap at Nkrumah, president of Ghana. Other countries represented at this meeting were Mali, Morocco, and Guinea.

Israel Invited to World's Fair

A representative of the New York World's Fair committee has presented an official invitation to Israel to participate in the 1964-65 Exposition. It is expected that Israel will accept the invitation.

Hassidic students Join Israel Army

A group of students from the Vizhnitzer Yeshiva in B'nei B'rak, discarded their long kaftans and black hats last week and donned the khaki uniforms of the Israel Army as volunteers. They were welcomed by Army Chief Chaplain Rabbi Shlomo Goren.

In taking the Oath of Service they were permitted to say "I undertake" rather than "I swear" in accordance with their religious convictions. To the phrase "to devote all my strength to the defense of the country and to Israel's freedom". they added the expression "in the spirit of Torah and Tradition".

THE WEEKLY PORTION Vaera, Exodus 6:2-9:35

The portion opens with a promise of God to Moses to fulfill his covenant with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The Holy One instructs Moses to tell the children of Israel that; "I will bring you out from under the burdens of the Egyptians, I will deliver you from their bondage, I will redeem you with an outstretched arm . . ., I will take you unto me for a People . . ., and I will bring you unto the Land." These are the five "statements of redemption" which are noted in the Talmud and in commemoration of which we drink four cups of wine on Passover and fill a fifth cup for Elijah.

The bulk of the portion is an account of the requests of Moses and Aaron to Pharaoh to allow the Jews to leave Egypt, at least temporarily; the intransigence of the Egyptian ruler who refused to consider such a proposal; and the miracles which God brings to bear upon Pharaoh and the Egyptians in the form of plaques.

In this portion the first seven plagues are delivered: blood; frogs, gnats, fly-swarms, cattle-plague, boils, and hail. Inspite of the severity of the plagues, "The heart of Pharaoh was hard and he did not let the children of Israel go; as the Lord had spoken to Moses.
