Men's Club Brunch Meeting will Follow

On Sunday, February 12, the Kehilath Jeshurun Men's Club will continue a practice begun last year; the holding of a regular meeting in conjunction with the Father and Son Minyan Program. The meeting will begin at 9:30 with the regular Father and Son Minyan

The guest speaker for the morning will be Rabbi Isidore Meyer, Editor and Librarian of the American Jewish Historical Society. His topic will be, "The American Jew in the Civil War."

This topic is extremely timely at present. During February there will be special exercises commemorating the centennial of the Civil War. A proclamation to this effect has already been issued by the President of the United

The role of the Jew in the Civil War has not been understood in the past. Some gross misconceptions exist concerning this role. Rabbi Meyer has done a great deal of research to ascertain the historical facts. He has just completed setting up an exhibit in the Jewish Museum on this subject.

Among the surprises which he will reveal at the meeting is the following case history. An eighteen year old Jewish lad enlisted in the Army of the North. He came from the State of New

Hampshire and rose quickly from private to lieutenant in the Northern Army. He was born of all places in Jerusalem.

The members of the club will be given a new insight by Rabbi Meyer into the role of American Jews in one of the most turbulent and significant periods in the history of this country. The meeting will also give our members a chance to participate in the Father and Son Minyan which is enjoying the most successful season in its thirteen year history. The service begins at 9:30, the breakfast will be served at 10:30, and the lecture will begin at about 11:00 o'clock.

This is an opportunity which should not be missed: a service of prayer, a community breakfast and a stimulating lecture on a timely subject. We hope that all of our readers will participate in this special Father and Son Minyan Meeting on February 12.

THE WEEKLY PORTION Yithro Exodus 18:1 - 20:23

"Honor Thy Father and Mother"

The portion of Yithro is known prin cipally for its account of the revelation of God at Sinai and the giving of the Ten Commandments. The Ten Commandments were engraved on two tablets, each containing five commandments. One of the explanations for this is that the first five deal principally with man's relationship to God while the second five are concerned with man's treatment of his fellow man.

We might question this classification upon noticing that the Fifth Commandment is "Honor thy father and thy mother." This, it would seem, should belong to those commandments which deal with man and his fellow man. Why is it part of the first tablet?

Nachmanides, one of the greatest of the medieval biblical commentators, in explaining the fifth commandment, answers our question. He states that this commandment is directed both to our relationship to man and to God. We honor our parents as partners with God in our creation. Furthermore, the honor which we must show towards our human parents parallels the respect due to our Father in heaven.

Thus, we are bidden to recognize that our parents are responsible for our well-being in the same way as we are commanded to remember that it was God who brought us out of Egypt (first commandment). We are obligated to affirm that no one can take the place of own parents in the same way in which we must not have any other Gods before "Him" (second commandment). We are also enjoined from calling our parents by their first names just as we are admonished not to take God's name in vain (third command-

ment). This requirment may come as a surprise to some modern parents who in their desire to create a strong fellowship with their children, encourage their youngsters to refer to them by their first name. This practice is, educationally speaking, open to serious question. From the point of view of Jewish tradition it is a grevious error.

There is one further insight which might be gained from the comment of Nachmonides. He seems to infer that man's relationship with his parents is inextricably bound up with his attitude towards God. Modern studies have affirmed this view. The parentchild relationship is the basis for all social and religious relationships. When a man is a good son and a women is a good daughter, the chances are that they will make good friends and good marital partners. Where friction exists in the home, the personality of the child is apt to reflect that friction in all of his social relationships.

Much the same can be said for religion. A child who is antagonistic to his parents will find that his attitude towards God will also be warped, either by rebelliousness against religious leaders or, perhaps through an overcompensation, by compulsive religious behavior. Only when a child can respect, revere, and love his human parents, is it possible for him to respect, to revere, and to love his Divine creator.

ADULT INSTITUTE MID-YEAR REPORT

Over Thirty Per Cent Increase Noted in Student Body

The Adult Institute of Congretation Kehilath Jeshurun has reached the half way mark in its academic year. The Fall Term was concluded during the past week and the Spring Term begins this Saturday. New students are eligible and encouraged to enroll for the new term.

For the benefit of our readers who may not be aware of the progress made by the Institute this year, we present the following progress report.

Enrollment of 201

Af present, there are two hundred and one students enrolled in the various courses in the Adult Institute. About forty of these students are taking two or more courses so that the actual number of persons registered in the Institute would be about one hundred and fifty. These figures represent and increase of about thirty per cent over last year.

Included in the three lectures presented by the Adult Institute prior to this past lecture and who are, therefore, in a position to receive credit for this series if they attended Rabbi Besdin's lecture.

Included in the figures are fortytwo members of our two Am HaSefer groups. Each of these people are reading four books of Jewish interest during the course of the year and meeting in a discussion group to analyze the books individually.

135 Enrolled in Weekly Courses

Finally, there is an enrollment of one hundred and thirty-five students for our regular weekly courses. Of this number, one hundred and three have been sufficently regular in their attendance to receive credit for their work. These enrollment and credit figures represent a rise of thirty-five per cent over last year's record. Actually the number of people who are receiving credit is slightly lower than the figure above, inasmuch as some of our students are taking two regular courses, as you will note from the adjoining list.

In the adjoining columns we list the names of the students who are entitled to credit for their work during the Fall Term. We congratulate them upon their dedication to learning. We hope that others will follow their wonderful example.
