ONE HUNDRED ATTEND SPECIAL FATHER AND SON MINYAN

Men's Club Hears Rabbi Isidore Meyer

A capacity congregation filled the synagogue chapel to overflowing last Sunday as the Men's Club held a special meeting in conjunction with the Father and Son Minyan. Following an inspiring service, the congregation retired to the social hall to enjoy a community breakfast. The meeting, was chaired by William Lebowitz, the chairman of the Father and Son Minyan Committee for the Men's Club.

The highlight of the meeting was a fascinating address by Rabbi Isidore Meyer, the editor and librarian of the American Jewish Historical Society.

Our speaker briefed the members of the Club on the Civil War period in general. He cited the fact that Jewish participation in the war could be understood only in terms of the general history of that period. The distribution of the Jews in the North and South was roughly similar to the distribution of the general population. There were 6000 Jews in the Northern Army and 2000 in the Confederate Army.

Six Jews received the Congressional Medal of Honor for heroism in the Grand Army of the Republic and many Jews were equally heroic on the Southern side. Judah P. Benjamin, who served alternately as Secretary of War, Secretary of State, and Attorney General for the Southern Government, was quite frequently referred to as "the brains of the Confederacy". It has been reported that every Jewish family in the South supplied at least on soldier to the Southern Armies.

Rabbi Meyer presented many interesting side-lights concerning the effect of the Civil War on Jewish life in this

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein will preach this Sabbath at 11:00 A.M. "THE ANCIENT TABERNACLE AND THE MODERN HOME" Lessons In Moral Decor country. He read a letter signed by a German Jewish immigrant who suffered great hardship as a result of an act of piracy perpetrated by the Confederacy on an American ship during the war. He read an article describing how a group of twenty Jews in the 23rd Regiment from Ohio celebrated Passover in the mountains of West Virginia. The writer states that the fiery herb which was substituted for horseradish was much more bitter than anything our forefathers ever experienced in Egypt.

Rabbi Meyer also made mention of the fact that a Doctor Zachary — a Jew — was Lincoln's chiropodist and was described as the man who "kept Lincoln on his feet". This same Zachary was sent as Lincoln's emissary in 1863 to a conference in Richmond at which he tried to arrange terms for peace. The attempt was, of course, a failure.

Our speaker, who had intended to speak for about half an hour continued his remarks for a full hour. The listeners were so absorbed, that time did not seem to be of much consequence.

The service, the meeting, the address of Rabbi Meyer, and the closing remarks of Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein made this a memorable occasion for the Men's Club.

(Un Terumah, Exodus 25:1 - 27:19

The Tabernacle

as a Democratic Institution

The central theme of this week's portion from the Torah is the building of the Tabernacle. This sanctuary was to serve as the central place of worship and Divine service until such time as a permanent Temple would be built in Jerusalem.

It might be assumed that, inasmuch as the priests were the main functionaries in the Tabernacle, they would have complete control over its activities. The fact is, however, that the sanctuary was a democratic institution.

This state of affairs was insured by granting to each individual Jew the "power of the purse" in the affairs of the Tabernacle. The opening verse of this week's portion states "speak unto the children of Israel that they may take for me an offering from every man whose heart prompts him to give." In this way, each citizen had a share in the building of the Tabernacle and in the sacrifices which were brought therein.

There was a time in Jewish history when the priests tried to preempt control in the sactuary by bringing the sacrifices from their own funds. This practice, however, was rejected by Jewish Law. Public worship was ordained to be a democratic institution in which each member of the community had a share and which was therefore to be controlled by the general public. Such a system entails an obligation upon the public. Each citizen had to make his own contribution in accordance with his means and financial ability. Only in this way could each individual be a partner in public worship.

What was true of the Tabernacle is true of the institution of the synagogue. The synagogue is a democratic institution in that it is under the control of a congregation of individuals and not dominated by a particular class. There is no Jewish aristocrary in the synagogue. Its activities are made possible by the contributions and support of every member. The obligation of the membership to support the House of God, brings as its reward the right of every member to benefit from the synagogue and to have a share in its program and policy.

YOUNG ADULTS LEAGUE HEARS BOOK REVIEW

The January meeting of the Kehilath Jeshurun Young Adults League presented a panel book review discussion of the best seller by Andre Schwartz-Bart, "The Last of the Just". Two members of the group, Shari Lookstein and Lawrence Kobrin, were joined by a guest reviewer, Miss Lisa Billig, for the discussion which took place on Sunday evening, January 29.

A group of about 50 young people heard Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein introduce the subject by pointing out to those present the importance to the Jewish community and to the world at large of such books as "The Last of the Just".

Shari Lookstein was the first member of the panel to discuss the book. A literary and publishing editor by profession, she analyzed the book from the point of view of its literary impact and method. Miss Lisa Billig, who has recently reviewed the book for a national 'Jewish publication was a guest member of the reviewing panel. She discussed at some length the concept of martyrdom as it is expressed in the novel.

Lawrence Kobrin offered a summary and conclusion for the panel in setting forth some of the many ways in which the contents of this book could be considered. These included, he said, not merely its literary merit, but its religious, historical, and psychological-implications as well.

The audience present was far more than a mere listening group for, following the presentation by the members of the panel, there took place a vigorous discussion on the comments of the members of the panel and on the book itself.

The Young Adults have arranged for a varied program throughout the remainder of the year, including several social events and meetings. Further information regarding this group, which is open to young men and women between the ages of 18 and 30 is available from the synagogue office.

HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST

Morocco Acts Against Jewish Press

It has been reported from Paris, that the Moroccan Government has taken the first step in what appears to be a campaign to suppress the Jewish Press. A Jewish Weekly (Trait D'Union), which began publication recently, has been ordered to shut down. Its editor has been picked up by police authorities for investigation. In addition, the Central Communal Organization has received notice that the publishing license for its monthly organ is to be withdrawn.

U.N. On Anti-Semitism

The Fourteen Member U.N. Subcommission on "Prevention of Discrimation and Protection of Minorities" unanimously adopted a resolution condemning "manifestations of Anti-Semitism in forms of racial prejudice and religious intoleration of a similar nature."

The resolution calls on the Human Rights Commission to adopt a resolution calling for "Specific Measures" to combat intoleration through legislation by U.N. Member Governments.

Bar Mitzvah Group and the Bar Mitzvah Year

The first organized group of Bar Mitzvah boys has come to Israel to mark the Bar Mitzvah year of that State. To date some 25 young men, the majority of them from South American countries, have celebrated their Bar Mitzvah in Israel.

Ancient Village Discovered In Southern Israel

A settlement dating back to the 4th Millenium B.C.E. was uncovered recently at Gat, Southern Israel. The prehistoric village is situated near the modern town of Kiryat Gat.
